

HARRISON IS ELECTED

The Counting of the Ballots Confirms the News Told by the First Returns.

The Figures Show that Harrison and Morton Will Have Two Hundred and Thirty-Three Votes in the Electoral College.

Indiana Will Do Her Entire Share and Contribute Her Fifteen Ballots.

Returns from About Half of the Hoosier State Show that Harrison Electors and the Entire State Ticket Are Victorious.

A Plurality Exceeding Eleven Thousand Makes New York Fully Secure.

And the Thirty-Six Votes of the Empire State Will Assist in Restoring the Republican Party to Power and Usefulness.

The Next House Is Likely to Contain a Majority of Republican Members.

And All the Signs of the Times Indicate that the Incompetent Democracy Will Occupy a Rear Seat for Many Years to Come.

STATE OF INDIANA.

Precinct Returns Showing the Growth of the Republican Gains.

Seven hundred precincts show a net Republican gain of 5,053. Seven hundred and sixty precincts give Harrison 122,175; Cleveland, 113,206. The same precincts in 1884 gave Blaine 111,137; Cleveland, 107,959. Net Republican gain, 5,791.

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BLOOMINGTON, Nov. 7.—The Republican majority in Monroe county is 225, the largest on record. The entire ticket is elected. No trouble was experienced, although United States deputy marshals attempted to interfere in one or two instances, but were soon given to understand that the least exercise of power, when uncalled for, would result in a United States marshal getting hurt, and that was the last heard from them. For Congress, H. C. Duncan, Republican, has 200 majority.

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

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THE REPUBLICAN RESTORATION.

The Excitement in Washington—Col. Lamont on the Democratic Defeat.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—The excitement in Washington has been at fever heat ever the result of the election. This was caused by the enthusiasm of the Republicans, who were confident of the success of General Harrison on the one side, and the hesitation and uncertain reports in certain New York newspapers, which left the outcome in apparent doubt. Democratic office-holders and Democratic politicians clung to this slender hope in desperation and ventured to express the belief that Cleveland might yet pull through. They could not believe that the man of destiny had been defeated, and they did not want to let go their hold on the money they had been betting so lavishly while there was the faintest chance to recover part of it by hedging. To intensify the excitement bogus dispatches were put out at Democratic headquarters, and some of the bucket shops, alleging that errors had been discovered in Kings county and throughout New York State which changed the result to Cleveland. Republicans stood confidently and manfully by their convictions all day long, eagerly taking up all the bets they could at odds as great as one hundred to twenty. In well-informed administration circles there was absolutely dejection. Colonel Lamont regarded the thing as settled, though he said he had no information beyond what he got from the press dispatches. These indicated, he thought, a plurality of from 7,000 to 10,000 for Harrison in New York. He said he knew nothing of the facts, and had not heard from Senator Gorman or Chairman Brice. He was not especially disposed to speculate on the cause of the result. Money he mentioned as one thing. He significantly declared that Governor Hill had done all he could for the ticket, and that the votes he got that Cleveland did not were from the Republican liquor interests, and could not be controlled by any one. He did not think that the result in the city pointed to much trading. The Colonel, like Mr. Cleveland, did not permit his disappointment to show on his face. He would not give out any of the dispatches received from his friends last night. Secretary Whitney said that the loss of New York to the Democrats was caused by the fact that the newspapers had not been properly educated to the effect of the Mills bill. The question, he said, had not been properly presented to them, and they were made to believe that the Democrats were free-traders, instead of mere tariff reductionists. Mr. Foran, of Ohio, the Democratic labor candidate, said: "I am not good on a post-nominate committee, claims the West Virginia legislature, which gives that party a United States Senator in the place of Kenna, and says also that they will have a good majority in the House. It looks as if the Republicans are completely restored to power, with the loss only by appointment under the Supreme Court and one Associate Justice.
