By the Year 1900 They Will Number 130,000,000 People.

Mr. Gladstone, in Youth's Companion. In an article contributed to the Youth's Companion, of Boston, on "The Future of the English-Speaking Races," Mr. Gladstone estimates that the habitual speakers of English have increased from 15,000,000 to 105,000,000 during the last 100 years...

The increase during the last century has, of course, been due chiefly to the immigration into the United States. Since 1787 our population has been multiplied twenty times, while that of the British Empire itself has only a little more than doubled.

Mr. Barham Zincke, a well-known writer, estimated the world in 1883 by estimating that in one hundred years from that time the aggregate of the English-speaking races would be 1,000,000,000. Of these the United States would have 200,000,000, estimating our rate of increase at 2 per cent. annually...

Whether the present rate of increase in this country continues during the next century, or whether it falls from 3 to 2 per cent, or even lower, is no question that here is the great seat of the English-speaking race, and here it will be the most numerous.
