THE NEGRO'S AIM WAS BETTER. NEW ORLEANS, April 21.—The Picayune's Bastrop, La., special says: "Charles A. Pope, who lived ten miles from here, was killed, last night, by negroes. A Collector's Accounts Confused. ST. JOSEPH, Mo., April 21.—In making a final settlement with ex-Coleman, Trice, County Judge Keene discovered that the report of the treasurer showed that Trice had paid over \$12,884.17 more than his statement showed he had collected, while the State Treasurer's statement showed \$602.17 less than claimed, making a surplus unaccounted for of \$11,682.24.
