

A WON GAME NEARLY LOST

Good Fielding by the Indianapolis Club Enables It to Win from Cleveland.

Though the latter club had a streak of batting in the ninth inning—Chicago, Washington and New York the other winners.

CLEVELAND, May 10.—Indianapolis won from Cleveland to-day. The game was a hot one, and was marked by a close finish. The crowd and players were worked up to boiling point, but Gruber made the mistake of a weak batter, and, after getting three of the needed four runs, the Clevelanders were retired with Tebeau on third base. Good luck and Myers's fine throwing to second enabled Indianapolis to win. They played a stiff fielding game, however. Gruber pitched a good game, showing great speed and fine command of the ball. He fielded his position perfectly, and held his runners close on the bases. The team wobbled behind him, and this and the luck of the game going to Indianapolis lost it. The Hoosiers earned a run in the first inning on Glasscock's bouncer, Denny's short fly, and McGeechey's sacrifice. They got no more till the fifth, when Seery opened with a base on balls. Glasscock's safe grounder to left, just as he started to steal second, sent him to third, and Denny's buster to right sent him in. Glasscock went to third on Denny's fly, and scored when Denny interfered with Stricker's throw to catch him between second and first on a slow-steel play for Glasscock's run. Denny stole second, and was declared out for interference with McKean on Sullivan's grounder to him. Sullivan stole second, and ran home on Faatz's muff of Myers's ugly hit back of first. In the eighth inning Sullivan scored again, and his was the winning run. He forced Denny out after a safe hit to left, second, and scored on a low pitch by Gruber, which got away from Zimmer and bounded through the bleaching boards.
