

DISPUTES OF THE BALL CLUBS

Meeting of the Board of Arbitration of the National League and Association.

No Material Changes Made in the Agreement—Reservation Clauses Regarded as a Legal Contract for a Term of Years.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—The board of arbitration of the base-ball league met in the Fifth-avenue Hotel to-day to take action in regard to the qualifications necessary for players who wish to join the National League and American Association.

The board consists of Messrs. Young, Day, Rogers and Byrne of the League, and Messrs. McCann, McCann and Byrne of the Association. There are a large number of base-ball representatives in town, who expect to take part in the proceedings of the next few days.

After the conference had ended President Young and Secretary Byrne were re-elected for the ensuing year by Krauthoff casting a ballot for the board. The first matter to follow was the dispute of the Chicago and Western Association. The league and association have this right, and small clubs claim that it is only fair that they should have it also.

Colonel Rogers moved to amend Paragraph A of Article II of the national agreement, which provides that the reservation contracts for twelve months, or a term of years, instead of seven months. After discussion the board concurred that the reservation contracts made thereunder, in effect provided a legal contract for a term of years under which the rights of the clubs, and the services of its reserved players were irrevocable and enforceable in law and equity.

It was decided to give the minor leagues the power to control and reserve players, the national league and association—that is, when a player refuses to sign a contract the club can reserve him from year to year. He cannot, however, be indefinitely suspended.
