

THE FEDERAL ELECTION BILL

Views of Mr. Manderson as to the Course Republican Senators Ought to Pursue.

He Thinks if the Democrats Try to Talk the Measure to Death the Majority Should Stay with Them if it Takes All Summer.

Close Votes in the House on the Adoption and Rejection of Amendments.

Great Interest Shown by Colored Men, Who Fill the Galleries During Debate—Will Be Only Three Dissenting Republicans.

MUST FIGHT THE MINORITY.

Mr. Manderson's Views Concerning the Federal Election Bill in the Senate.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—A caucus of the Republican Senators will shortly be held to determine what is to be done with the federal election bill after it passes the House.

It is very likely that the suggestion made by a number of Senators to let the bill remain before the committee on privileges and elections until the next session will not prevail.

While there are some conservative Republicans who believe that it will be better in the long run not to attempt, for two or three reasons, to dispose of the measure at this session, others agree that it would be a show of weakness on the part of the Republicans, who have a clear working majority, to refuse to take up the measure simply because a number of Democrats threaten to talk it to death.

Senator Manderson, of Nebraska, is usually considered one of the Republicans who know what is going on in the Senate, and who occupies a conservative position before that body.

He said this afternoon of the outlook for the election bill: "If the Republicans in the Senate conclude to let the measure go over until the next session it would be a frank acknowledgment that they fear the work of the Democrats. It would be an announcement to the country that a large and vigorous majority fear a fair and open contest with the minority. I think we shall take the bill up despite the threats of the Democrats to talk all summer, and consider it in good faith and with the determination to get a vote upon it at the earliest possible day. I have no doubt that the Democrats will talk upon the bill indefinitely with the determination to defeat it operation at least till after the forthcoming election. There are a number of Republican Senators who oppose the measure on general principles, and others who take exceptions to its details. It is a question of policy that should be well considered, is the way I look at it. This may not be the time for the federal government to interpose its control over local elections, even though Congressmen are involved in the result. The federal government already has a general supervision over congressional elections, and the question is, whether Congress has not already gone as far as it should go. This same general question of policy arose when we were confronted with the condition of negro slavery. There is no doubt that, had we taken exceptions to its details, we should have done so. As Senator Edmunds said the other day, if the minority want to enter upon a game of physical endurance, the majority can stand it as long as the minority and meet the climax bravely. I am in favor of giving the Democrats the right of a silver measure are out of the way and proceeding with its consideration as expeditiously as possible. It is necessary to stay here in constant session until after the election in order to reach a final vote upon the election bill, very well. The majority can stand it as long as the minority can. This is a question of general principle, and I do not think any Republican Senator will vote against the measure, because it does not meet with his views as to detail."

As anticipated, the contest in the House over the bill is not over, but the final result is not feared by the Republicans. There was one test vote taken to-day, which resulted in 133 yeas, at least, which is a vote of only six. It was stated that just outside the Capitol building, at a neighborhood bar, were eight Democrats at the same time as taken and none of them were paired. Had they been present the opposition would, of course, have succeeded and an amendment for the prohibition of South Carolina would have been adopted and the bill practically ruined. It is now pretty clear that more than three Republicans will vote against the bill in its final passage. They are Messrs. Coleman of Louisiana, Ewart of North Carolina, and Tamm of New Jersey. The latter says he objects to the bill because it is so stringent in the matter of citizenship and he has a number of foreign-born constituents. He has asked him to oppose the measure. The other two Republicans against the bill say they are acting in the interest of the South in their opposition, and that the measure is sectional. During the debate every day the longer the galleries on the north side of the great hall the more the colored men, who show great interest in the future of the bill and eagerly drink in every word. There have been several additional amendments offered and the final vote may not be reached until late tomorrow afternoon, but there is no doubt at this time in the mind of Speaker Rice that the bill will be adopted in the House, and before the adjournment to-morrow.

CHANGES IN THE BILL.
