THE TARIFF MUST STAND

Plucky Republicans, Not Disheartened by Defeat, Eager for Another Fight.

They Stoutly Maintain There Must Be No Modification of the Party's Policy—The Situation as Governor Hovey Views It.

The temper of Republicans hereabouts is such that they will not admit anything into their calculations concerning the next campaign that does not mean an aggressive fight. Those who did the work and voting Tuesday last are the last one wants to approach with any expectation of finding discouraging predictions as to results two years hence. They are not giving way to any mourning over defeat, and when they hear suggestions as to future policy they are not one expression, "Pass the election bill and let the McKinley law stand without a change, even to the dotting of an i or crossing of a t." A reporter of the Journal has, since last Tuesday, asked hundreds of Republicans as to what they thought ought to be done, and the answers, in effect, without exception, were: "If the country is to be wrecked let the Democratic party do it. We want no part in it, even to a modification of the tariff law. That law is all right, and we as Republicans have but one duty to perform. That is to see it is sustained. We are willing to meet the Democrats again on that issue, and we don't want it as emphatic as it can be made. When two years go by there will be no opportunity for persistent fight, constant misrepresentation and malicious criticisms by the Democrats concerning the effects of the tariff. The McKinley law will by that time become adjusted to trade, industries and commerce as perfectly as the political party that disapproved it might as well retire. There will be no further chance for the tin-ear and pearl-tongue scum. The Republican party has the votes to sustain the tariff, and we are every issue that school of expediency and demagoguery may raise. Why? Because the Republican party is always right on issues of great or small that mean the general welfare of the country, and the Democratic opposition is always wrong."

This represents the Republican sentiment, and as a guarantee of its sincerity not one from whom these expressions came failed to urge immediate organization. They want the work to begin at once, and carried on with vigor until the last day in the ballot-box in 1912. Among those who expressed themselves substantially as above quoted was Governor Hovey. My political career," he further said yesterday, "will close with my present term as Governor. There is nothing ahead for me but to take place in the ranks and do all I can to carry on to the end of the party. My defeat is not discouraging, for we have the opportunity to do away with the most serious causes that led to it."

What, in your opinion, Governor, contributed materially to the Republican losses?" the reporter asked. "As I observe the conditions under which the last campaign was carried on there were four causes that operated against us. First, our espousal of the local option principle. That made a decided impression against us in the large cities, especially among the Germans, and cost us 10,000 votes."

"But without that principle what would you do to confront the evil of the saloon power?" "License; high license, I mean. Let the fight be made squarely upon that demand."

"There were three more. One was disappointment concerning federal appointments; and the McKinley bill, concerning the tariff, did just before the election, and third, the failure of Congress to satisfy the demands of the soldiers. For every man who got an office under the average eight to be disappointed. The disappointed became apathetic and of the good they could do the party was deprived. This does not mean an absolute loss, but the Republicans, for their services and voices will be available in the next campaign. I have had, as president of the Service Pension Association of the United States, better opportunities than any one to ascertain the feeling of the old soldiers to pension legislation. My communications with them have been constant, through letters and in person. They think they have not received what they have a right to expect. Gen. Harrison and myself carried the State by more than two thousand majority, and yet a change from 15,000 to 20,000 has been made against the Republicans, and that was caused by several thousand of those who voted in 1888 not voting in 1890. The soldiers almost without exception voted the Republican ticket two years ago; this year no Democratic soldiers voted that ticket. The voters and those of Democratic antecedents constitute about one-third of the soldier vote of the State, which altogether is between 60,000 and 70,000. "How would you reclaim it?" "It can be done by Congress at the coming session passing two laws. The first should be that of service pension. If that opportunity go by to enact such a law, the Democrats in the next Congress will do it, unless they are to have Cleveland at the head of their Presidential ticket. We in Cleveland for a presidential candidate, they will be stultifying themselves on the pension question. The Southern Democrats will submit to such a course, but they will think they can continue themselves in power by so doing."

"What have you to say in regard to the McKinley law?" "Much of the future will depend on that law. Its construction will be measured by the people by the prosperity of the country, and, with it successful, we will ride into power. There should be no modification of it. It is not the time to make any modifications of Republican policy. If in the next year the country is prosperous, that prosperity will be attributed to the law; if not the conditions will be charged to the Republican party."

"The sermon Hovey left last evening for Mount Vernon, where he is to remain several days attending to private business. Rice's Luck as a Prophet. James H. Rice is just now regarded by his fellow Democrats as being gifted with second sight. His pre-eminence as a political prophet is apparent to them and they are wondering where he attained such a desirable gift. Just prior to the late election he spent some time at Democratic headquarters examining reports and poll-books, and after a long and minute inspection he was asked what his deductions were. "The Democrats," he replied, "will have at least 17,000 majority on the State ticket, and our majority in the Legislature will be 100 over."

"The listeners in the committee-rooms gasped for breath, and Sterling R. Holt laughed scornfully at Rice's prognostications. All of them thought it would be a close race, and were quaking for fear the Republicans would win. Chairman Jewett smiled sadly and shook his head. Rice noted all this skepticism and remarked: "It will be just as I have told you—that is, if these reports and poll-books are correct. Of course, if they are in error, the prediction don't go, that's all." Editor Watterson, of the Louisville Courier-Journal, also thought Rice had lost his senses, when in response to a question as to the Legislature, the "fifty majority" was returned. It seems, however, that the "power behind the throne" knew what he was talking about, or else had better luck than the general run of political prophets.

Shortage in Some of the Counties. The first official returns that came to the Secretary of State were from five counties carried by the Republicans two years ago and two in which the Democrats were successful. The result this year shows the Republicans in their five counties need 2,313 votes to equal those cast in 1888, while the Democrats in the same counties were only 686 behind. Hendricks carried in 1888 620 above, and of these 587 were Republican and 133 Democratic. Montgomery the Republicans lost, as 640 of them out of a total shortage of 812 either failed to vote or were practically disfranchised, and were defectively balloted, the Democrats losing only 172. Fayette's shortage was 345 Republican and 81 Democratic. Fayette 517 and 195, respectively. Morgan 274 and 50, the Democrats there, like those of Marion, almost equaling their vote cast for Cleveland. Sullivan, another of the seven counties used in this connection, fell behind 307 Republicans and 471 Democrats, and Tipton, also belonging to the latter, was short 220 votes of the party in majority and 378 Republicans. Of the rest named in Marion 2,374 were either not at the polls or not counted, while the Democrats were only 88 behind. Together, in the counties named the Republicans were 5,272 short, and the Democrats 1,400.

THE DOCTORS NOT NEEDED

Christian Scientists Discard Them and Their Pills, Powders and Liquids.

Mr. Mason Addresses an Intelligent Congregation on Principles of the New Faith that Puts the Spiritual Above the Physical.

At the northwest corner of North and Alabama streets, in the building that was once known as Trinity Methodist Church, and more recently as the Boys' Classical School, there meets Sunday after Sunday a small congregation of believers in Christian science. More than three-fourths of those who assembled there yesterday afternoon were women, and this is true of the attendance upon all the services held in the place. The congregation was refined and intellectual in appearance and uniformly well dressed, and the vocal music was accompanied, not by an organ, but by a piano. The speaker yesterday was F. E. Mason, of Brooklyn, N. Y., who, in beginning his lecture, said the quackery of one generation is the philosophy of the next; the fallacies of one generation are the facts of its successor. "If Christian science is good," he continued, "you want it; if not, you do not want it. Man is the offspring of infinity. What I see here, this semi-day of infinity, is not the likeness of the infinite. It is a perversion—an effigy. Man is his own worst enemy. The star in the east that shines to-day is the science of Christ. The whole world is talking Christian science and yet does not know it. The time is coming when the evidences of the senses will be put away. They are absolutely false. There is not a single one of the five senses that can be trusted. We cannot see, smell, taste, feel or hear God, but Christian science tells us as long as you put your trust in the senses you will have no rest. The meaning of the word 'science' declares this an abnormal condition; that it does not apply to man. It is the physical law instead of the spiritual law. It declares that man is not a creature that conceives it. It is simply the evolution of a carnal thought. You never can make flesh spiritual any more than you can make darkness light."

"Christian science," further said Mr. Mason, "emphatically declares that God is not the author of the physical world, and that flesh does not express spirit. Sickness, disease and death are not the reflections of life, truth and love. How wrong is the meaning of the word 'prayer.' Eighteen hundred years have gone by, and we have not yet reached the meaning of it. Jesus said, 'After this manner shall the kingdom of the world be the kingdom of God. The kingdom of God is in heaven.' Orthodox enthusiasts heaven somewhere in space, and we can reach it by our prayers. Jesus said, 'I have come on earth and give us this day our daily bread.' We gain eternal life by living, not by dying. We are not to be afraid of death, for we are in the grave. He said, 'Lo, the kingdom of heaven is within you.' We have it by pulling out the claims of mortality and putting on the garment of spirituality. Christian science teaches that man is spiritual; that he is perfect; that he does reflect all the attributes of the infinite, that God could not create anything higher than man. It is impossible for God to create anything beyond himself, and man was made in the image of God. Orthodox says it is impossible for man to do the things that Jesus did. Jesus said the works that I do ye shall do and greater; and he said 'follow me, and ye shall have life, and shall not perish.' Christian science declares it is possible for man to do anything that Jesus did. God is no respecter of persons, and if Jesus did it, we can do it. We are not to be afraid of death, for we are in the future where we cannot reach him except by death, and Jesus is 1,800 years behind us. So we have neither of them.
