COST IN CITY AND COUNTRY

Teaching in Rural Districts More Expensive Per Pupil than in the Towns.

School Superintendents Consider That Feature of Instruction and Also the First Draft of a Compulsory Education Bill.

The State Association of City and Town School Superintendents resumed its proceedings yesterday morning, with Supt. L. H. Jones, of this city, in the chair. The discussion of topics began with Prof. R. I. Hamilton, of Huntington, commenting at length on the report of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, pointing out where it favors the country districts at the expense of the city. He said he was inclined to question many of the statements in that report in regard to the city schools.

Prof. Jones cited the State constitutional provision as evidence of the purpose and wisdom of its framers, for sixteen cents on the dollar for the purpose of education was supposed to supply all the money needed for rural districts, and the grant of special money to cities to levy a special tax was given because of the greater needs of funds to carry on the town and city schools.

Professor Hamilton, of LaPorte, in the afternoon reported a draft of a bill for compulsory education. It provides for the education of all children between seven and fifteen years of age, in reading, writing and arithmetic, history of the United States and geography, all in the English language.

LAWS THE FARMERS DESIRE

Binetalism and Free Coinage of Silver Supported by Their Alliance.

The C. Line Blotted Out After a Breezy Discussion—Purchasing Agency to Be Established—Committee on Legislation.

The Indiana Farmers' Alliance concluded its session yesterday, adjourning toward the close of the afternoon. The morning was devoted largely to a discussion of additional resolutions reported by the committee. There was a split in the committee, resulting in majority and minority reports. The majority report was adopted entire, as follows:

We favor a binetalist system of coinage, and the free and unlimited coinage of silver with the character of full legal tender, the same as gold, and we recognize the fact, however, that the question has in international bearing and we demand that our national government exercise itself to the utmost to bring about such international agreement as shall make it possible without disturbing the business conditions of the country or placing us at a disadvantage in any respect.

We demand a thorough and radical revision of our state laws, and also demand for an equal and fair assessment of all kinds of taxable property, real, personal and corporate, to the public burdens; that mortgages and other incumbrances upon real estate shall be assessed as if the money loaned were a loan to the borrower from a double tax.

We are in favor of just and equitable pension legislation, and in favor of private pension bills. We demand that the means of communication and transportation shall be under such government control as may be necessary to secure fixed and reasonable rates.

The following was also adopted: Whereas, The Indiana Farmers' Alliance, desiring to cooperate with kindred farmers and laborers' associations; and among the organizations of the State, county and local organizations of this State be instructed to seek to accomplish the result in their respective spheres of activity, and to the ultimate object of consolidating these organizations.

At the afternoon session the Alliance Advocate, published in this city by J. G. Kingsbury, was made the official organ. The resolution was adopted in several particulars, the most important of which was the elimination of the word "white" from the eligibility requirements.

General Manager Bradbury, of the Lake Erie & Western, declined yesterday to receive the demands of the trainmen and those in the yard service who came to him as members of a federation. He informed the men that he would listen singly to their demands. He expressed, however, the engineers and firemen, with whom, he said, his road has a contract, such Chief Arthur, of the Brotherhood, in a fence.
