NOT SHOWN TO VISITORS

The State-house Basement with Its Large Plant for Heat and Ventilation. Regulating Time Throughout the Building by an Electric System—Valuable Military Stores and Equipments for the Indiana Legion.

While the upper part of the State-house is visited by nearly everybody that comes to the city, and has been traversed from end to end by the residents of Indianapolis, the basement is comparatively unknown. High board fences enclosed the square and shut out the view from the Capitol as being built, hence few knew as they stand in the center of the massive structure that twenty-six feet beneath the basement floor begins the huge pyramid of masonry which supports the enormous weight of the dome. In the basement is afforded a view of the great thickness of the stone pillars rising up out of the base, and the sight gives one an impression of solidity obtainable in no other public building in the State. Down there are the boilers, steam-pipes, air-flues and other appurtenances which belong to the heating and ventilating system of the building. Four great boilers, under which natural gas roars and seethes in fiery flame, supply the steam for direct heat and heat the air for indirect radiation. A feature of the steam-pipes is that they drop at every elbow in order to allow the condensed steam to run off and be clear of the live steam. Hence one never hears the pipes about the building creaking, hissing and cranking. The condensed steam has been collected and conveyed back to the boiler to be used over again, and to accomplish that a vast number of pipes, aggregating miles in length, are required. To the system of ventilation belong four large fans, in each quarter of the dome, supplying fresh air from the outside in many ways. In summer the air goes unobstructed throughout the building, explaining why, in the hottest weather, the State-house is cool; but in winter it is heated and speedily reaches a comfortable temperature. The chronometer of the State-house is also in the basement. It is connected electrically with each of the seventeen clocks in the building, securing the regularity in running time which Charlemagne tried so ineffectually to obtain. Chief engineer Kain, who has charge of the basement floor, keeps the chronometer under lock and key and a Journal reporter asked him yesterday how he turned the hands of the clocks back or forward.

"By pressing a button," was the reply, "I can turn them forward, or by shutting off the current hold them till time catches up. But all hop the minute spaces at the same time."

"But suppose the Legislature should want to continue the last legislative day?" "It can be done now. Many of the members would have each given a farm two years ago to have had the key so as to set the clock back, but I wouldn't let them have it. Every day closes at 12 midnight here."

A large part of the basement is occupied by the quartermaster-general's department as an armory. When Quartermaster-general Pope went into office, two years ago, he found the State's military property scattered about over the floor, uncleaned, out of repair, and losing value from moth and lack of attention. "My first work," said he to the reporter, "was to have things put in order. The State has a large lot of lumber for which no one would pay its value, so, instead of sacrificing it, I had it brought down here, employed a man, and made shavings of it. You can see it loaded with great quantities of tents, blankets, camp equipment, clothing and other articles. The most costly of these, such as uniforms and blankets, I had stacked away after renovation, between layers of tar-paper. In these cases there, pointing to a long

CANNOT OPERATE INDEPENDENTLY.

The New Orleans Firm of Bakers Want Into the American Company and Must Stay.

A Journal reporter asked Mr. Alex. Taggart, of the firm of Parrott & Taggart, yesterday, in reference to the injunction ant brought by the American Biscuit and Baking Company against Klotz & Fitzpatrick, of New Orleans, to restrain them from carrying on the cracker business independent of the company in which they are interested. "Our firm," said he, "is not in the American but the United States Baking Company, which is similar in its workings in every respect. Klotz & Fitzpatrick are merely stockholders in the American, and can do no more without their consent. They have been losing money for years—the founder of the business, Margaret Huger, having grown old, and died. Fitzpatrick, who has been in as a partner by her in her declining years, but is himself a wholly uneducated man, signing his name with a cross. It is probable that his incompetence has caused managers of the joint company to stir him up on business methods or something of the kind, which has angered him and induced him to attempt to draw out of the company. But he is in it to stay, I believe, unless he sells out. The charge that he did not know the nature of the business, and that he is wholly untried, as I personally know, the articles of association were read to him, and bear his signature with a cross. "But what of the charge of the company violating State and national laws, through the nature of its operations," the reporter asked. "That is not well founded," said Mr. Taggart. "The company is not a trust, but a joint-stock company, which is not affected by the anti-trust law, as it is not within its scope. It is better than a trust for both manufacturers and consumers, since in the latter case the goods are sold at less cost and better quality than when each factory was independent."

USED IN SOLOMON'S TEMPLE.

Mr. Herman Gottschalk Has a Coin That Possesses a History of Unusual Interest.

Herman Gottschalk, of New York, was at the Bates House yesterday. He is the possessor of a coin known as the holy shekel, of which only one counterpart, he says, is known to be in existence. "This is not only a coin," he said, as he handed the little piece to a Journal reporter, "but it was used as a tribute in Solomon's Temple. On one side its characters read 'Holy Shekel,' grouped around a star, and on the other side is the inscription 'Jerusalem.' This piece of money was used as an offering at feasts and ceremonies of prayer. I have documents that show it to be genuine. "How did it come into your possession?" the reporter asked. "Eleven years ago I was in Romania," he replied, "and stopped at the Brumwick Hotel, on a warrant from Topeka, Kan., was again arrested at the same hotel, yesterday, by detective Page, on a warrant from the sheriff of Pawnee county, Missouri. He is charged with forging the name of Stephen Rosner to a quit-claim on 160 acres of land. He was slated at the station-house as a fugitive, to be held till the Missouri officers arrive. Rowlen declines to leave the State without requisition papers, and he says he compromised the Topeka case to his own advantage. Rowlen has been in this city a week or so.
