

"Battle of Flowers" to-day at Ventimiglia. He will remain in the Riviera for a fortnight before he returns home.

The Bismarckian Munich Allgemeine asserts that the French Cabinet is divided on the question of forming a war with Germany. M. De Freycinet, the French Minister of War, and Constans, Minister of the Interior, are urging the government to seize the earliest chance to attack Germany, while Freymann, the French Minister of Finance, and M. Ribot, the French Minister of Foreign Affairs, advocate peace.

The Austro-German commercial treaty, it is expected, will be concluded on the 15th inst. The decrease of 3 1/2 marks in the duties on grain granted to Austria will be the feature of the treaty. The German government of Vienna will shortly issue a statement declaring that in view of the danger which threatens Austrian manufacturers from over-production in Germany, the loss of the American market and the closing of the French market, together with the decline in the premium on gold, increased facilities are required for the export trade to Germany. In the event of a refusal of these demands, the government, the chamber holds, ought to reject Germany's concessions to the Austrian agricultural interests.

**FRANCE SOLID FOR PROTECTION.**

Views of Leading Statesmen on the Subject.—No Favors for Americans.

PARIS, March 7.—The great tariff debate, occurring in the Chamber of Deputies next week will probably last until midsummer. Among the prominent politicians interviewed on the French tariff was M. Jules Ferry. During a long conversation on this subject M. Ferry said: "We shall impose low duties on the products of all countries whose tariffs favor us. If the United States reduces its tariff it will be the gainer in its trade with France."

M. Turrel, one of the ardent protectionist deputies, remarked: "France is forced to protect herself against foreign prohibition, especially against the United States. We do not wish to attack anybody."

Dr. Viger, another protectionist deputy, expressed the view that "We raise our tariffs because the free-trade regime of 1850 reduced the wholesale prices of our products without a corresponding reduction in the retail prices. We cannot reduce the tariff duties, but we intend to remove the prohibition placed upon American pork. We shall ask in return that the United States shall modify the features of the United States tariff which bear heavily on French exporters."

M. Deon Say, discussing the same subject, among other things said: "The traders now exist in France, and there is no prospect of the adoption in France of free-trade principles during our time."

M. Molari, in a recent interview, in conclusion said that the reaction in France in favor of protection is complete. France likes to eat its cake, and yet have it. The United States shall modify the features of the United States tariff which bear heavily on French exporters."

Emile Zola is at present suffering intensely from rheumatism. In a recent interview he stated the United States copyright bill would be a boon for French authors; that it would increase their revenue and secure them better translations. The regulations, he said, had hitherto been dreadful.

PRESSURE.—The storm area in the southwest moved northeastward, extending along the Mississippi valley; it is central Saturday night, with 29.56, in Mississippi; the high area, still central near Lake Winnipeg, is extending south and eastward.

Snow Twenty Feet Deep.

DENVER, Col., March 7.—Reports from the San Juan county and Cone Jose range state that the country is completely buried in snow. Railroads and toll-roads are blocked, and all travel has been suspended and cannot be resumed for weeks. The fall of snow has been the heaviest for years, and covers the ground in many places twenty feet deep. The towns of Silverton, Lake City and several mining camps are entirely cut off from communication with the outside world. The provisions are running low, and unless the blockade is soon raised, considerable suffering is being felt.

Mis Ashes Thrown into the Ohio River.

CINCINNATI, March 7.—The Ohio river to-day received the ashes of Prof. Wilhelm Steudel, of Louisville, Ky. He directed by will that his executor should convey his body to Cincinnati, have it cremated, and then consign the ashes to the Ohio river. Mr. Anton Kutziel, representing the executor, had the body cremated. The ashes, in a porcelain urn, were delivered to him to-day. He chartered a skiff and was rowed out to the middle of the current. There he cast into the water the ashes. The ceremony was as simple as it could be made.

Murderer Crawford Will Confess.

DECATUR, Ill., March 7.—To-day Wm. H. Crawford, who is charged with the murder of a woman, wrote a confession, telling the manner in which he killed Mrs. Mathias, but he will not consent to the publication of the same until after his death. Important details have always been shrouded in mystery, and it has been thought that Crawford had an accomplice.

Mr. Rockefeller Gives Bond.

NEW YORK, March 7.—In connection with the warrants issued by the New York coroner for the directors of the New Haven railroad, Mr. Wm. Rockefeller furnished bail yesterday. The director, went on the bond, giving as security his residence, No. 4 West Fifty-fourth street, which is valued at \$100,000.

**SHOT DOWN IN THE STREET**

**Two Wheeling Physicians Fall Out and One Receives Two Bullets in His Head.**

Dr. George Baird Killed by Dr. George Garrison. After the Former Had Called the Latter a "Niggerf---er"—A Bitter Feud.

WHEELING, W. Va., March 7.—A tragedy, which had been long predicted, occurred on Eleventh street at twenty minutes to 11 o'clock this morning, when Dr. George Baird, one of the oldest physicians of Wheeling, a member of the city water board, ex-member of Council and of the Board of Public Works, a member of the board of directors of the Wheeling Bridge and Terminal Railway Company, and a man very prominent in local politics and municipal government matters, was shot twice and almost instantly killed by Dr. George I. Garrison. The latter is a member of the State Board of Health, late health officer of the city, and a man widely known over a large section of country as an authority on matters of sanitation. The murder was the outgrowth of a feud of more than a year's standing, and the crime created the wildest excitement. Many threats of lynching were made against the murderer after the shooting.

About 9 o'clock this morning the two men met in the second ward market and had some words. They separated, but about 10:30 Dr. Baird drove past Dr. Garrison, who was standing at Market and Eleventh streets. Dr. Baird passed Dr. Garrison, he said to a friend: "There is going to be trouble." He then walked up Eleventh street, and stopped Dr. Baird at the corner of an alley. The two talked for a moment, and Dr. Baird drove on about fifty feet, and alighted to see a patient. As Dr. Garrison came up he had a revolver in his hand, and "Take that back, doctor."

Dr. Baird replied: "I don't have to take it back, you niggerf---er." As Dr. Baird slowly turned squarely toward him Garrison fired a second time. The ball took effect in Baird's left eye, the first shot having struck him in the forehead. Dr. Baird then walked into a store, said that Dr. Garrison had shot him, took off his gloves and was dead in ten minutes. Dr. Garrison was taken down the street holding his victim until he met a policeman, to whom he surrendered himself.

The men were on the best of terms until eight months ago Garrison evicted him from his office. When Garrison was elected health officer Baird performed the duties of the office, allowing Garrison to draw the pay and attend lectures in Baltimore. On being elected to a second term, bearing Dr. Baird's son, there was a falling out, and Garrison had Baird arrested for a violation of the health ordinance. This led to a personal encounter in the City Hall last August, when Baird was knocked down. Since then Garrison has threatened to kill Baird, and to-day the hospital records was the inevitable end. Dr. Baird graduated in James G. Blaine's class at Jefferson College, Washington, Pa.

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**THREATENED BY THE MAFIA.**

**Mayor Shakespeare, of New Orleans, Again Threatened—Trial of Alleged Assassins.**

NEW ORLEANS, March 7.—Coroner Lemmonier reported to Judge Baker this morning that Pollet is not insane, but his mental condition is affected by fear and loss of hope. John Q. Flynn, an attorney, had been appointed to defend Pollet. At 11 o'clock court took a recess till 1 P. M. During the recess Pollet again lost his mental control and commenced raving. It required four deputies to hold him down on a lounge while his friends tried to pacify him. Mayor Shakespeare has received an anonymous letter threatening him with assassination in case any of the accused Sicilians now on trial for Hennessey's murder are convicted.

When court reconvened this afternoon Pollet had quieted down and the defense introduced a number of witnesses, including Mr. Adams, one of the attorneys for the defense, who went on the stand to prove that Matranga, Machea and five others had been seen by Pollet at the time of the murder. The defense also introduced evidence in the Provenzo case. Afterward they went to the theater and then to a restaurant, where they met Mr. Adams and other witnesses. Mr. Adams and others swore that Sunzeri was one of the party. It will be remembered that officer Lorrigan identified Sunzeri and Natali as the men who ran away from the scene of the shooting.

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**FORCE OF NATURAL GAS**
