Oration from the People as He Was Leaving London Yesterday—Two Addresses in Which Parnell Was Given a Severe Drubbing.

LONDON, March 17.—Mr. Gladstone received a tremendous and spontaneous ovation to-day. He was leaving Charing Cross railway station for Hastings when an immense crowd gathered at the depot in order to witness his departure...

Previous to the departure of the train the executive committee of the Radical Association presented an address to Mr. Gladstone, in which it was stated that the association was hopeful of a brilliant triumph for Mr. Gladstone and his followers in the coming elections...

When the train in which Mr. Gladstone was traveling stopped at Tunbridge, a large crowd was found to have assembled there. Mr. Gladstone replied to addresses which were presented to him on the platform of the railroad station...

He inquired as to the condition of the spirit and basis would be unchanged from those of the former one [cheers], that it would be compatible with English honor, the object of peace and contentment in Ireland and life to the union...
