COMPTROLLER LACEY'S STATEMENT CONCERNING THE KEYSTONE NATIONAL BANK.

WASHINGTON, June 14.-The statement prepared by Comptroller Lacey and sent to Mayor Stuart, of Philadelphia, on the course pursued by him with the Keystone Bank of that city, was made public by Secretary Foster to-night.

ASSASSINATION OF CHARACTER

Inevitable Result of the Democratic Practice of Vilifying Public Men.

If Malicious Abuse of Office-Holders Is Continued Capable Men Will Refuse Place. Special to the Indianapolis Journal.

WASHINGTON, June 14.-The abuse which has been heaped upon Postmaster-general Wanamaker and Pension Commissioner Raum has called attention to the fact that no man is exempt from misrepresentation and calumny so long as he holds a federal position, and that it is comfortable for only two classes of persons to hold government offices-those who are so poor in this world's goods that they can have no other business connection with anything whatsoever...

WHY THE BANK WAS NOT CLOSED PROMPTLY. In answer to criticism for delay in applying a receiver, Mr. Lacey says it was not made immediately because it was the duty of the Comptroller to facilitate a re-organization of the bank.

THE COMPTROLLER STATES THAT POSTMASTER-GENERAL WANAMAKER NEVER DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY SOLICITED ANY POSITION IN THE CLOSING OF THE BANK OR THE APPOINTMENT OF A RECEIVER EXCEPT IN A TELEGRAM HEREAFTER QUOTED.

POSTMASTER-GENERAL WANAMAKER PROBABLY HAS FEWER PERSONAL ENEMIES THAN ANY MAN IN THE COUNTRY WHO HAS DONE SO MUCH IN BUSINESS, SOCIETY, POLITICS AND THE CHURCH.

CONCLUDING THE STATEMENT MR. LACEY SAYS: "I deem it my duty to say that, in my opinion, the several reports made by the bank examiner did not reflect the true condition of the bank as it existed at the time of the examination."

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FAREWELL TALKS TO SENIORS

Thirtieth Annual Baccalaureate Sermon of President Tuttle, of Wabash College.

Members of the Class of '91 Advised to Make Good Use of Their Talents and to Follow the Teachings of the Apostle St. Paul.

Able Address by Dr. Cleveland DeFord to the Students of Indiana University.

DR. TUTTLE'S BACCALAUREATE.

Eminent Talk to the Senior Class of Wabash College-The Temple They Should Revere. Special to the Indianapolis Journal.

CRAWFORDSVILLE, Ind., June 14.-President Joseph F. Tuttle delivered his thirtieth annual baccalaureate sermon and address to the senior class of Wabash College, at Center Church, this morning.

President Tuttle took his theme from I Cor. iii. 13: "The fire shall try every man's work, of what sort it is." He said, in part: "Although matter is indestructible, it assumes many forms. In many cases this change is called destruction. Fire is one of the strongest agents in effecting these changes. The thing to be tested by fire is a temple. Various materials are used in building it, and, in reference to their destructibility are called hard, wood, stubble and stone. Fire easily destroys a building of wood, hay, stubble but does not destroy one built of stone.

Then came the address to the senior class, which was as follows: "Gentlemen, seniors-First and highest of all, the man of whom St. Paul is speaking as a temple of God is a believer in Jesus Christ-he is a Christian. His faith rests on the only foundation, a rock, with such divine jewels as piety, grace, faith, hope, charity, temperance, industry, virtue, brotherly kindness, etc. Who builds this temple? Man himself is commanded to build it to himself, and he builds himself on the only sure foundation in a good man in which God dwells as in a temple.

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
