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SHOULD BE SENT TO CHINA

Oriental's Coming Here by Way of Canada Should Not Be Returned There.

Decision by Attorney-General Miller in the Detroit Cases—Condition of Crosses Reported to the Agricultural Department.

NOT BACK TO CANADA. Chinese Entered Here by Way of the Dominion Should Be Returned to China.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Assistant Secretary Spaulding has written a letter to the collector of customs at Detroit, Mich., based upon an opinion of Attorney-General Miller, in which he says: "The department is in receipt of your letter of the 27th ultimo, in which you report that three Chinese laborers found to be unlawfully in the United States, and whom the department had instructed you to send to San Francisco for deportation to China, have been returned to Canada by order of a United States commissioner at Detroit..."

It will be seen that the Attorney-General fully sustains the action of this department in the case of the Chinese laborers. He is of the opinion that they should be returned to China, even though they enter the States by way of the contiguous countries. Unless it is made to appear affirmatively that they are the subjects of some other country, a certificate of this character does not tend to establish such fact. It is understood to be issued by the Canadian government as evidence that the Chinese laborers have paid the tax of \$50 exacted of all Chinese on their first arrival in Canada, and its possession entitles the holder to a passport for pleasure, so far as the Canadian authorities are concerned, but it is in no sense any evidence of citizenship in Canada...
