

CONDITION OF THE MARKETS

Feverish Speculation in Chicago Grain Lacking, and Wheat Closed at \$1.05.

Big Premiums for Private Orders from the East - Numerous Receipts in Corn Knocked 2 Cents Off the Price of That Cereal.

MONEY, STOCKS AND BONDS

Business on "Change" Displays Strength in Spite of Discouraging Advice.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Money on call was easy, with no loans, closing offered at 3/4 per cent.

Prime mercantile paper, 5/8 @ 3/4 per cent. Sterling exchange was quiet and steady at 24 1/2 for sixty-day bills and 24 3/4 for the demand.

The total sales of stocks to-day were 90,988 shares, including the following: Atlantic, 11,000; Louisville & Nashville, 6,000; Missouri Pacific, 2,000; Northern Pacific preferred, 10,500; St. Paul, 7,500; Union Pacific, 7,500.

The stock market to-day again showed its inherent strength and to the face of unfavorable news from the corn belt and hammering by the advocates of lower prices, held its own and finally closed with a majority of the last fractionally higher than last evening.

The market opened under a heavy count, but first prices were irregularly changed from last night's figures with no material differences in any one class.

INDIANAPOLIS MARKETS. Trade disappointing in its volume, with prices unsettled.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 22.—In most departments the volume of trade this far this month has been disappointing, but that is not to be taken as a sign of depression, but on account of expectations having been built too high on the large crops and money being more plenty. A belief prevails, however, that next month the volume of trade will reach very satisfactory proportions, as the money will be in more general circulation.
