Vienna Rolls. Two teaspoonsful Cleveland's Superior baking powder, one quart flour, one teaspoonful salt, two tablespoonfuls butter, one teaspoonful sugar, one pint milk. Sift together flour, salt, sugar and baking powder. Rub the butter into the flour. Add the milk, then mix up quickly into a smooth dough. Roll an inch thick, cut with a biscuit cutter. Roll each biscuit between the hands into a roll four inches long. Place apart on buttered tins. Bake twenty-five minutes.
