

AN OLD-TIME MAYOR TALKS

Gen. Dan Macaulay Chats About Things of Local and National Importance. Progress of Indianapolis—Harrison's Administration and Indiana Appointments—Foreign Policy.

Gen. Dan Macaulay, accompanied by his son, Daniel Berner Macaulay, is in from Washington yesterday, and is registered at the Bates. General Macaulay has been absent from Indianapolis for twelve years, but the strength of his attachment to his adopted city is well known.

"A better name for my position," said he, "would be the disappointment office; this because of the number of petitions and places that must be refused."

"How does the administration stand with the people of other States? The administration cannot fail to give satisfaction to all who are Republicans for principle's sake."
