AVENGING A SHERIFF'S DEATH

Blood Again Flows in the Troubled Portion of Southwestern Kansas.

Four of Dunn's Slayers and Judge Botkin's Would-Be Assassins Shot to Death While Trying to Reach No Man's Land.

Ten-Mile Chase Followed by a Lively Running Fight of Four Miles More.

Several Arrests Made by Deputies and Soldiers at Arkanon and Springfield—Fears of an Attempted Rescue and Further Bloodshed.

ANOTHER FIGHT IN KANSAS.

Four of Sheriff Dunn's Slayers Shot While Trying to Escape to No Man's Land.

ARKANON, Kan., Jan. 7.—The bloodshed arising from the long-continued trouble in southwestern Kansas is not yet ended.

Deputy sheriffs have partially avenged the death of Sheriff Dunn. It is not known to be a positive fact, but it seems more than likely that as a result of the attempt of the deputies to bring the slayers of the sheriff to justice and force an expiation of the murder, four of the outlaws were killed this afternoon.

The report, however, needs confirmation before absolute reliance can be placed upon it. So far as is known these are the facts:

A courier arrived here at noon from the south line of the State. He reports a running conflict between the fleeing desperadoes and an armed posse of pursuers. According to his report there were two wagon loads with fifteen of the men participating in the Canyon battle. They had been encamped in a gulch south of Springfield, where they were discovered. They saw their pursuers at about the same moment, and then commenced a life-and-death race. For ten miles the two parties were not within firing distance, but just before dusk the pursuing party came within less than a quarter of a mile of the desperadoes, and then firing commenced. The running fight was kept up on a level plain for a distance of four miles. Following one fusillade men were seen to tumble from their seats in the wagon, one in one and three in the other. It could not be ascertained whether they were killed or wounded. The pursuing party finding that their jaded horses would not carry them further, made a detour of some half a mile to a ranch where they procured fresh horses and the race was resumed.

The courier started back from that point. He says the pursuing party, numbering fourteen men, would follow the desperadoes into No Man's Land, if necessary, and bring them back dead or alive. Another courier is hourly expected, and with him news of a battle, in which one side or the other will have sustained serious loss of life.

SITUATION AT ARKANON.

The Militia on Guard—Several Arrests Made—Judge Botkin Fails to Hold Court.

ARKANON, Kan., Jan. 7.—Company H of the State militia, under command of Capt. Hester, arrived here last night, and is camped in some vacant store-rooms. A number of people were gathered about the streets engaged in discussing the situation, and wondering what the outcome would be, but they displayed no arms.

The military had a quieting and soothing effect on them, also.

Contrary to a report circulated freely, Judge Botkin did not come to Springfield at all. The Judge intended to open and adjourn court at 10 o'clock this morning, under the protection of the militia, but the project was abandoned and he went to Topeka to attend the funeral of Sheriff Dunn.

At 11 o'clock the attorneys of Springfield declined to elect a temporary judge and to call a special hearing at the instance of the county attorney.

Col. J. H. Ricksacker and staff have established headquarters in an empty building, which is about 12x14 feet in size. A few blank checks appear to indicate that a banking business was once carried on inside of the building. A ton of bran stored in the room, in addition to the officers' traps, adds to the incongruity of the surroundings. Apparently every one who is said to have connection with the killing of Sheriff Dunn has vanished. The six outlaws who were arrested at the attack there were fifty men at least in the attacking party. They filled three covered wagons, and were on horseback. Not out can be found.

Adjutant-general Roberts sent a dispatch to Governor Humphrey this afternoon, stating that he had arrested and was holding four prisoners. He added that he anticipated no trouble as long as the troops remained. Adjutant-general Roberts received the following reply: "You are only to hold prisoners until warrants can be secured and served upon them. There should be no unnecessary delay in this."

It was learned to-day that the party killing Dunn, which numbered about fifty men, were made up of details from the counties of Seward, Stevens, Grant, Morton and Haskell. Threats have been made in each of these five counties that Judge Botkin will be killed, and the threats came from men known to be desperadoes.

The scenes in this county are feared in each of the other counties.

At 1 o'clock this morning a young man named Estes was arrested at his home in Fargo and brought here, where he is held by the troops. It is alleged that he was one of the party that killed Dunn.

LANARBER'S MURDER. One of the incidents of this trouble was the ride of Joe Lanarber, one of the men with Dunn when murdered. After the fight Lanarber, with three others, were chased to Springfield by seventeen of the murderous gang, and although within reach of the singing bullets, they escaped unhurt. Undaunted by his experience, Lanarber started out to avenge the death of his friend. He rode back to his own home, changed his name to Jones, and court documents summoned a posse, but refused to do anything until he rode back to Fargo and held a conference with Judge Botkin. This would take him out of the chase. It was alleged
