Witness—How long after the discovery of the fire before you got up there to alarm the patients?

Witness—Yes, sir; three or four boys, patients in the house; don't know who they were, but they were all boys, except the girls. Didn't see them when they came out. It must have been about fifteen or twenty minutes after 10 that they were in the hall. One of them was Clarence Curtis, and the other was William Rastack.
