Dear Sir—Looking over your commencement of your judgeship, including the rape case of the Green case, in which you acted as a juror, or what way is there left to put down crime of any kind? To put this matter short, there is one conclusion, and that is, you are a scoundrel, and therefore we give you ten days from this writing to leave the city, and if you do not leave by that time, we will give you a trial of choosing what tree you wish to swing on in the west yard. This is fair warning. Your constituents. W. H. CLAY.

There is no question that Judge Bailey will not leave the city, and will perform his duty as he sees it, regardless of threats of this character. There was some clamor over the Green case, in which he acted as a juror, and a new trial after conviction, and there has been a great deal of clamor from some of those who think Judge Russell is guilty, over positions taken by the judge in the trial, but the best lawyers appear to generally uphold the Judge, and he is known to be both upright and fearless.

Lawyer Russell, of Chicago, Creates a Scene in a Parlor Car and Is Locked Up. JERSEY CITY, N. J., May 15.—Isaac H. Russell, forty-seven years old, who is said to be a prominent Chicago lawyer, is confined at police headquarters in this city pending the action of his friends. Mr. Russell was a passenger on the Pennsylvania limited which left Chicago at 6:40 last night. As the train drew out of Philadelphia this afternoon Mr. Russell apparently became suddenly insane. He began to yell like a madman and started to undress himself in the parlor car in which he was seated. He was restrained by the conductor, who succeeded in partially quieting him, but the moment they left him the lawyer opened a struggle with the conductor and the latter was forced to leave the car. He was evidently preparing to follow his garments when he was seized. The train was stopped at a high rate of speed. This incident was confined to the smoking compartment until the train arrived at the station in this city. Detective Morris took charge of the lawyer, who was removed to police headquarters in a coach. Passengers of the train say that Mr. Russell was never heard of again.
