WORLD'S FAIR INTERESTS

Legislative Junket to the Indiana Building Made a Bad Impression.

Resolution Calling Sternly for an Itemized Account of Expenditures—Plain Talks from Members—Hard Lines Ahead.

The saturated remnants of the world's fair committee reached the city yesterday morning considerably the worse for wear and not in the best of humor.

Judging from the expression of members, it seems that the junket did more harm than good, and that the world's fair appropriation is likely to be considerably cut down.

"What do you think of the junket on the whole?" "I don't think so many extra unnecessary men should have been included in the party."

"What effect do you think the trip will have on the appropriation asked for?" "Well, to say the least, it will not increase it any."

Representative George C. Gregg, a member of the House committee on world's fair, and a contractor and builder by profession, stated last night that, although no appropriation was asked for the completion of the building, and although the cost was only \$6,000 left in the treasury with which to do the furnishing of the house would cost at least \$10,000.

Senator Aiken, who is a personal friend to Mr. Havens, was conservative, and made a few remarks under protest, backed by the consent of his constituents.

Representative A. C. Manwaring, of the House committee, thought the building should have cost over \$150,000, the most. The junket was a failure, and the prospective appropriation crippled by it.

Mr. Newby was particularly desirous of offending nobody by his opinions, and hoped his remarks would be received with a friendly spirit.

In regard to the committee's trip to Chicago, it is pertinent to say that the members of the committee on both sides from both houses are twenty-two in number.
