HOLE IN THE GOLD RESERVE

Secretary Carlisle Forced to Dip Into the Hundred-Million-Dollar Fund. Nearly Seven Millions Expended for Export To-day and Next Tuesday, with Less than a Million of Free Gold to Meet the Calls.

Two Hours and a Half Spent by the Cabinet in Discussing the Situation.

But No Inking of the Result Permitted to Escape—Calamity Prophesied at New York Non-plussed Because No Panic Occurred.

GOLD RESERVE BROKEN.

About Five Millions of the Yellow Metal Ordered for Shipment Abroad To-day. WASHINGTON, April 21.—At the Cabinet meeting this morning, at which all the members of the Cabinet were present, with the exception of Secretary Herbert, of the Navy Department, the financial situation, it is understood, was among the exclusive topics of discussion.

While nothing official can be obtained here as to the decision of the Treasury Department in regard to the payment in gold of treasury notes tendered on the 15th of 1890, the fact that these notes are being paid in gold upon presentation proves conclusively that the Treasury has decided that when the limit of the gold reserve he would exercise his discretion and pay the class of notes, when presented for redemption, in gold.

NO EVIL RESULTS. The Financial World Not Shaken Because the Reserve Was Touched—Views of Bankers.

NEW YORK, April 21.—The upper crust of the hundred million gold reserve has been removed, the financial world has stood by and witnessed the doing of it, and yet tonight in this financial center, the streets of the earth are full of folk who are most interested in wondering why there has been no crash of worlds nor wreck of spheres.

Most of the bankers profess themselves unable to comprehend Secretary Carlisle's explanation with reference to the treasury notes. J. Edward Simmons, president of the Fourth National Bank, said: "Mr. Carlisle has announced no policy. This word means nothing so far as any solution of the question is concerned."

WILL GO TO A PREMIUM. Predictions of Chicago Bankers Regarding the Sale of Gold.

CHICAGO, April 21.—"I think Secretary Carlisle made his intention quite clear in his statement," said J. B. Forgan, vice president of the First National Bank, this afternoon.

LAMB DISGUSTED.

ARRIVAL OF THE CARAVELS. The Santa Maria, Nina and Pinta Towed Into Hampton Roads Yesterday.

Received with Nelly Salutes and a Display of Flags—The English and Russian Admirals Likely to Worry Secretary Herbert.

FORT MONROE, April 21.—The three Columbus caravels arrived here at half past 10 o'clock this morning, in tow of the three Spanish war ships, and were received with great thunders of salutes and display of the flags of the countries represented by the fleets, and dropped anchor at the end of the American line of vessels.

President George S. Cox, of the American Exchange National Bank, said he thought that all this talk about gold in the West was rather absurd.
