A special train of ten locomotives and twelve cars illustrative of the evolution and development of the locomotives of the world left Baltimore Saturday night for Chicago. It is part of the exhibit to be shown at the world's fair by the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company.

The train records show that in the week ending May 22 there were 222 fewer loaded cars received and forwarded at Indianapolis than in the week ending May 15, but the movement was compared with the corresponding weeks of 1892 and 1891, showing an increase, this year, of 262 and 295 loaded cars.
