TOPNOTCH CITY TAXES

Mayor and Controller Recommend that the Levy Remain 60 Cents,

Notwithstanding the Fact that the City Will Not Have to Pay for Any More Street Improvements.

ESTIMATES FOR A NEW YEAR.

Financial Report for the Past Year Makes a Bad Showing.

Over \$63,000 Spent on Unpaved Streets with Nothing to Show for It—Heavy Increases Along the Line.

Although the money needed by the city next year for streets will be decreased \$28,000 by reason of the law passed by the last Legislature, and although numerous other expenditures ought to be cut down, Mayor Sullivan recommended to the Council last night a tax levy of 60 cents for the coming year.

On the 25th of May last the city controller awarded to Coffin & Stanton, of New York, \$621,000 of the city's four and a-half per cent, three-year refunding bonds.

interest thereon from the date of demand, and that she will retain so much of it as is necessary to make her whole in the premises.

On account of the failure of Coffin & Stanton to take \$621,000 of the city's refunding bonds awarded them last May, which was to be taken and paid for on the 1st day of July last, the city was unable to pay at maturity \$600,000 of her 7-3/4 per cent bonds, due July 1, 1893.

Not a long time ago Mayor Sullivan's administration told the Council that it would only need \$100,000 as a temporary loan to tide it over until the November settlement.

The message of the Controller was referred to the finance committee. A special meeting of the Council has been called for to-night to advance an ordinance embodying the Controller's request to its passage.
