ROCKFORD, Ill., Jan. 3.—Burglars blow open the large safe in the Franklin Grove Bank, south of this city, last night, and made away with everything of value in the vault. On enquiry it was learned that the safe had been blown open, papers strewn about the floor and everything in general scattered about the vault. The bank was plundered out of the cash and securities, and the doors closed and refused to open until the next morning.

NO SHOW FOR MELLO. The Brazilian Rebellion as Reviewed by a Coffee Merchant. Piexoto Liked by His People, and Said to Be in the Right—Admiral Da Gama's Latest Proclamation.

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—Thomas Conner, of this city, has returned from Brazil, where he has been looking after the coffee interests of his business house. He was in Rio de Janeiro at the time of the outbreak of the Mello rebellion. "The whole affair," he says, "is a political fight between the 'outs' and 'ins.' Mello and his party became jealous of Piexoto's influence and distribution of patronage. They attempted to drive him out, but he would not go, and the people are with him. The bombardment of the city by Mello's fleet followed. It was a lively time at first and Mello started the intention of the foreign war vessels to prevent a blockade of coffee, and the export duty being paid keeps the treasury of the government in good condition. Mello recognizes the fact that it is terribly appalling to him to see the coffee-laden vessels go by his fleet day after day. Once in possession of the coffee duty he would have things his own way. Coffee rules in Brazil, and he is the President who holds the purse strings. With the Netherlands and America that Piexoto purchased in New York, there ought to be no trouble in changing the insurgent fleet from Rio, and that once done the affair is over."

Manifesto by Da Gama. RIO DE JANEIRO, Jan. 3.—Admiral De Gama, commander of the insurgent fleet in the harbor, published yesterday a manifesto which was intended to counteract the effect of his celebrated declaration of a month ago in favor of the monarchy. This declaration has weakened the cause of the insurgents greatly in the last three or four weeks, and has alienated from Mello and Da Gama several officers who, before his appearance, had been their trusted friends and allies. Among the people at large its effects have been still more unfavorable to the insurgents' cause. Consequently, in his manifesto, yesterday, Admiral Da Gama asserted that his former declaration was not a monarchist's document. This declaration, as well as other papers attributed to him, he said in the manifesto of yesterday, had been altered and printed in falsified copies. He had not declared for the monarchy, he said, but only for the republicanism which he wanted. Other interpretations of his declaration had not been made in good faith. This manifesto has fallen flat. Friends of the republic regard it as a passing maneuver to win support for the insurgent cause. They are not gaining for the insurance any new republican friends. The manifesto has disappointed the monarchists, and has thoroughly disgusted with Da Gama's back-down.

Something May Happen Soon. PERNAMBUCO, Jan. 3.—The United States cruiser San Francisco sailed from this port for the south to-day. Important developments, the officers of the San Francisco say, are expected at Rio de Janeiro. Admiral De Mello and his warships, the Aquidaua and Republica, have not yet arrived off this port, and it does not seem that there is any immediate probability of a naval battle being fought here. It is announced that the United States and German war ships, acting in concert, have notified Da Gama, the rebel admiral, that the fire of his ships must be so directed as not to interfere with the German and American vessels at the anchorage used for loading any discharging merchant ships. The latest report received here is to the effect that Admiral De Mello sailed north to meet the Niteroy, but, upon hearing that she had been reinforced by the American rebel admiral, he is said to have turned about and to have gone southward again. It is also reported here that a number of mines in iron on board the Aquidaua, as well as on board the America, and that serious disturbances have occurred on both vessels.

No Trouble Apprehended. WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—The secretary of the Navy has received the following cable from Admiral Benham, on board the San Francisco: "PERNAMBUCO, Jan. 2.—Everything is quiet as possible throughout Brazil. There is no reason to apprehend trouble at present. Will leave here to-morrow for Bahia." The Miantonomoh is still at Norfolk, and has received no orders to put to sea. No word was received of the departure of the New York from St. Lucia, British West Indies. The Kearsarge had been detailed to the duty of destroying derelicts in the north Atlantic. It was found necessary to destroy the derelict in the vicinity of the insurgent outbreak there. It is intended that the Vesuvius shall cruise to destroy derelicts, but she is at present undergoing some slight repairs, which will not be completed until Jan. 6.

Rumor by Way of Lisbon. LONDON, Jan. 3.—A dispatch to a news agency from Lisbon says: Advice from Rio de Janeiro asserts that Admiral Da Gama has succeeded in effecting a landing at the custom house of that city, which should enable him to support the safe landing of eight thousand troops, who are daily expected from Santa Catharina.
