DULL IN WALL STREET

None but Professional Traders Were Interested in Deals.

Stocks Had a Downward Tendency All Day and Closed Weak—Indianapolis Grain Declining.

At New York yesterday money on call was easy at 1 per cent, the last loan being at 1, closing offered at 1 per cent.

Prime mercantile paper, 3 1/2 to 4 1/2.

Strategic exchange was easier, with actual business in bankers' bills at 4 1/2 to 4 3/4 for demand and at 4 1/2 to 4 3/4 for sixty days.

LOCAL GRAIN AND PRODUCE.

Oranges weaker, poultry strong and provisions unsettled.

A quiet mood has struck the wholesale streets again and much less activity is noticeable than on Monday and Tuesday.

Onions are off 2c a bushel. Poultry advanced on a better Eastern demand.

Provisions are unsettled, several descriptions declining, while pork and lard advanced.

In groceries steadiness is characteristic and the same is true of dry goods. Several changes will be noticed in the raw fur market.

WHEAT FALLS 1-3C

After a Spurt There Was Liberal Selling on Weak Cables.

Price Current's Estimate of an Over-supply of Pork Compared with Last Year Sent Provisions Down.

CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—Free selling and weaker cables sent wheat down 1 1/2 to 2c.

After an early advance some buying caused a reaction and May closed 1/2c lower than yesterday.

What opened higher, with May 1/4c up, at 67 1/2c. Baldwin-Farnum were vigorous sellers at the start and prices soon declined.

At the decline, however, Logan & Co., Schwartz-Dupe and others began taking short wheat, and Murray, Nelson & Co. bought 100,000 bushels, supposedly for Armour.

The scalpers immediately climbed into the buyers' band wagon and a reaction occurred, which carried May to 1/4c above the opening figures.

The advance could not be maintained long, however, in the face of the lower cables, and prices again began to decline.

Chicago receipts were light, but at Minneapolis and Duluth were heavier than last year.

During the remainder of the session there was plenty of wheat for sale, and the decline continued with a few exceptions until the close.

Bradstreet's sent a correction of the available supply of wheat, showing only 17,000 bushels for the Pacific coast instead of 200,000 bushels as reported, and making the net decrease 32,000 bushels.

This caused a reaction, and as the 100,000 bushels export clearance from the four Atlantic ports and New Orleans, which amounted in wheat and flour to 280,000 bushels, is being shipped from the bottom figures of the day, May opened 1/4c higher, at 68 1/2c, declined 1/2c to 68c, and closed 1/2c, raising 1/2c to close at 68 1/2c.

Corn opened firm, with May unchanged at 52c, and declined 1/2c to 51 1/2c, and closed 1/2c, raising 1/2c to close at 52c.

Provisions opened strong, advanced on the fill of a strong order, but was, however, a disposition to rally by some of the local operators, caused some fluctuation in the market.

The Cincinnati Price Current's estimate that the corn crop for 1894 will be 2,000,000 bushels, and that the 1893 crop will be 2,000,000 bushels, is a very liberal one.

Subsequently, however, the market was supported by a part of the early decline was recovered, and the price advanced 1/2c to 52c, and closed 1/2c, raising 1/2c to close at 52c.
