EVIDENCE OF BLANCH'S SUICIDE. He Was Racked with Disease and Was Very Gloomy.

Coroner Beck is positive that the body found near Fairview Park last Saturday is that of Willard Blanch, though he admits that possibly something new might be turned up after an examination of the rifle found last September by O. W. Sicklin, an employe of the water works company, near the spot where the body was found.

W. C. Housel, residing at No. 57 North Alabama street, who was a very intimate friend of Blanch, yesterday stated that he thought the body to be that of Blanch. He added that at the time of Blanch's disappearance he suspected suicide on account of Blanch's condition, which was afflicted with an incurable disease, and which at times affected his mind, causing him to grow despondent and at other times to disappear.

WASTING THE FUNDS

Queer Action of County Commissioners in Dr. Robeson's Case.

Allowed Him Salary Regularly, Although He Left the County Six Months Ago—Other Instances.

The record of the Marion County Commissioners for the last few years discloses a state of affairs that is particularly of interest to the taxpayers who have entrusted these Democratic gentlemen with the administration of county affairs.

Some time late last spring it was noted in the daily papers that Dr. W. C. Robeson, who formerly lived near Southport, had suddenly left the city and that his friends did not know where he had gone.

Dr. Robeson was secretary of the County Board of Health, one of the county sinecures. Although he left this city last spring, the record of the commissioners shows that Dr. Robeson has been paid his salary from time to time up to within a few days of Jan. 1, 1894.

Dr. Robeson was well known in the southern part of the county and his absence from the city was unexplained at the time, although he was a man not known to have any bad habits or to have been in any trouble. He was a Democrat and was appointed by the commissioners on account of the influence he was supposed to have in the Southport neighborhood.

On the peculiar entry on the minute book is that of Oct. 21, 1893, where Prosecuting Attorney Holtzman is allowed \$250 for services rendered in prosecuting a case against Dr. Robeson, who was arrested in 1892, to May 22, 1893.

On the minute book is an entry for the month of June, 1893, where Dr. Robeson is allowed \$37.50 for live stock insurance, making a total of \$58.45. The county has two horses at the workhouse and the value of both of them would not exceed \$30.
