TROUBLE NEAR CANNELBURG

Baltimore & Ohio Coal Train Held Up by Fifty Strikers.

Deputy Sheriff Sent to the Scene with Orders to Disperse the Rioters by Calling Militia to His Aid.

FARMERSBURG, Ind., June 5.—The expedition of five hundred troops to Alum Cave to-day from this place was barren of results, and it is doubtful if the militia can suppress the rioters unless Sheriff Mills and the county authorities give more efficient and more vigorous aid.

TROUBLE AT CANNELBURG. Miners Reported to Have Seized a Coal Train.

WASHINGTON, Ind., June 5.—A crowd of about fifty miners is reported to have taken charge of a coal train at Cannelburg and resisted the efforts of the trainmen to move it, threatening violence.
