

AN UPWARD TENDENCY

After unloading a little sugar prices rose on change. Only a few shares were active in the board business.

At New York, yesterday, money on call was easy at 1 per cent. Prime mercantile paper, 2 1/4% per cent.

Total sales of stocks yesterday amounted to 153,917 shares. There was little or nothing of interest in the share speculation and although the closing prices in most cases showed an advance, compared with Monday, there was nothing of buoyancy in the market and the trading was, as a rule, irregular and unsettled.

When this was out of the way, a good buying movement was inaugurated by brokers of the sugar clique and, as prices moved upward the shorts began to cover.

There was a good deal of stock bought to close out short accounts in view of the closing of the books for the dividend tomorrow. In the late dealings the stock rose 1/2, leaving a net gain of 1 1/2.

The railway and miscellaneous bond market was firm for a day for the leading issues. Some shares, however, recorded losses.

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BULLISH AT CHICAGO

Light offerings and bullish speculation in New York, Chicago, indicated an advance here of 1/4c in June and of 1/2c in futures beyond this month.

Big Trade and Wide Fluctuations in the Leading Cereal, Other Grain and Provisions Feeling It.

CHICAGO, June 12.—The market news today was generally bullish and wheat finished 1/4c higher, corn closed 3/4c higher, oats 1/2c higher and provisions at an advance all round.

There was a large trade, fluctuations being sharp and frequent within the range of 3/4c. Opening trades were at 1 1/2c advance, and after selling down 3/4c advanced 3/4c, declined 1/2c, rallied 3/4c, changed some and closed nearly at the top.

On the other hand, the State reports of Kentucky and Michigan were quite favorable. The Kansas weekly weather bulletin also reported a well-distributed rainfall and the Baltic shipments were much larger.
