SLOW TO INVESTIGATE

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS AND THE WORKHOUSE SCANDAL.

They Will Look Into "Goose" Eden's Conduct—The Part Mr. Matthews Took.

In speaking about the article in yesterday's Journal in regard to disgraceful practices at the workhouse, Judge Stubbs said there was a slight mistake in it, which did an injustice to Assistant Superintendent Matthews.

Matthews, the statement of Hall, as given, charged that Mr. Matthews had told him that Reardon was "all right," and would do as he said in regard to any matters that might be entrusted to his care.

Through an oversight it was not stated that Matthews had denied this charge as soon as he heard it Monday afternoon. In speaking of the matter yesterday Matthews said that when the question was asked him by Hall he turned his head away and said nothing. This would remove the charge of assisting in these questionable practices by an open act.

When asked why he simply turned his head and said nothing when Hall appealed to him to know if Reardon was "all right" he said: "I did not want to have anything to do with the matter. I couldn't very well answer 'no' right there, and I did not want to answer 'yes,' so I just kept my mouth shut and said nothing. It was none of my business."

Afterward Judge Stubbs said: "I have the highest regard for Mr. Matthews, and do not believe he would be guilty of accepting a share of the money or valuables received from the prisoners, but from his own statement he evidently has been guilty of neglect of duty in allowing the prisoners to pay money to any one for services rendered in an attempt to get them out of the workhouse, and is deserving of censure for it. As to the other men, I am ready to reaffirm my statement, as made in the Journal this morning. This is a matter which calls for an investigation by the County commissioners. I understand that "Goose" Eden denies that he had ever had the watch which was returned to Superintendent Powell yesterday. All I know about that is what John Reardon said. He said plainly that the watch was in "Goose" Eden's hands, and that he would have to go to the workhouse after it. He was gone long enough to have made the trip out there."

"Is there any part of the statement in the Journal which is not correct according to your information?" "Excepting that part of which I have just spoken concerning Mr. Matthews, I have found nothing which is not according to the statement made to me yesterday by the persons concerned." "The board were seen yesterday afternoon and asked what action the board would take in regard to the charges." "We have just been discussing the matter with the attorney, Mr. Brown, and are not yet prepared to say just what will be done," said Mr. Hunter. "I can say this, however: There will be an investigation of the matter. In just what form it will be conducted, I cannot say. I have had a further consultation with Mr. Brown and hear what Mr. Reinicke has to say."

Mr. Stout acquiesced in what Mr. Hunter had said.

Mr. Knippenberg this week has ordered the board of directors at Indianapolis to pay the stockholders on the 25th inst. dividend No. 13 of \$2.00. This makes the total dividends paid up to date by the Hecla company \$1,000,000—Butte (Mont.) Daily Commercial.
