MAY WHEAT LOWER

LOSS OF 1-4 ON LOCAL BEAR NEWS AND WEAKER CABLES.

Corn and On Futures Were Also Weak and in Provisions General Declines Followed.

CHICAGO, Dec. 14.—A bearish report on wheat-feeding in Illinois and lower cables weakened wheat to-day, May closing 1/4 lower.

The wheat market received a shock at the opening in the early cables. Liverpool was from 1/4 to 1/2 lower, cables in London 3/4 to 1/2 lower.

Corn was dull, governed for the most part by the weather, however, was improved and better trading was looked for in consequence.

Provisions were dull and rather weak, closing with a loss of 1/8 in pork, 1/4 in lard and 1/2 in ribs.
