Setting Forth Present Condition and Future Requirements of the Various State Institutions.

A COMPREHENSIVE DOCUMENT

EMBODYING SUGGESTIONS FOR BETTER ENFORCEMENT OF LAWS, A Full Statement of the Finances, a Review of Recent Domestic Troubles, and Other Topics of Interest.

It becomes my duty, under the Constitution, to give you such information touching the condition of the State, and recommend such measures as shall be judged to be expedient.

STATE FINANCES. They Are in Satisfactory Condition—Recommendations as to Refunding.

Of the financial condition of the State—the management of its public institutions and of the several State offices during the past two years, it will not be expected that I should, in this paper, go into full details.

THE PRESENT INDEBTEDNESS OF THE STATE IS AS FOLLOWS:

During the past two years it is a matter for congratulation that the necessity has been removed for the issue of temporary interest loan bonds, nor for the increase of the State debt. In fact, this debt has been reduced by the issue of temporary interest loan bonds, making a saving in the annual interest charge of \$42,300.

Grand Total.

The State now has an option on the redemption of the following issues of bonds, viz: Three-and-one-half per cent. temporary loan bonds, 1885, \$360,000.00; Three per cent. temporary loan bonds, 1887, \$1,000,000.00; Total \$1,360,000.00.

On March 2, 1896, the 3 per cent. temporary interest loan bonds of 1891, amounting to \$200,000, will become due. On April 1, 1896, the 5 per cent. temporary interest loan bonds of 1892, amounting to \$200,000, will become due.
