Mrs. Burton Harrison, the writer of charming articles for women, has in a recent number of the Outlook a resume of "some sins of society." "Even at the present advanced stage of the world's civilization in minor points," says Mrs. Harrison, "there remain two or three particulars in which certain of our countrywomen continue to grievously offend good form, and thereby bring upon themselves the rebuke of the initiated both at home and abroad. I refer especially to the curious misapprehension of propriety in costume intended for entertainments where daylight, albeit excluded by shades and curtains, and put out of countenance by gas and electricity and candles, still lingers around the scene. This variety of social function has so many things to recommend it that it is not surprising that we do not prospect for its evanishment from society. In our countrywomen, however, as we do at great distances one from another and as long, the means of transportation for well-dressed people on pleasure bent are so few and dear-parties of daylight will be their vogue. "Therefore, to the greater number of sociably inclined people, the costume of ceremony is a most desirable and simple, not too bright and good for humar nature's ally wear in the evening. It is simple, but, at the same time, allowing for every display of elegance in cut and fit and becomingness of tint. What, then, can be more absurd than for the hostess and her bevy of receiving friends upon these occasions to assume the habit of a society evening dress, with bare neck and arms, clinging fans and bouquets, and displaying necklaces and tresses of gems fit only for evening entertainments of highest formality. This, to the hostess, is a most unwelcome and a most unfortunate appearance of a lack of other opportunity to display cherished finery. It has well written laws that govern this important detail such mistakes should not continue to be made. But, more than this, the hostess in evening clothes striding among his fellow countrywomen, and in the afternoon festivity is no more out of place than a woman equipped in a décolleté gown—and yet what a pathetic spectacle such a male offender would be!
