PERSUADED TO QUIT

NONUNION MINERS AT POMEROY, O., INDUCED TO JOIN THE STRIKERS.

Only One Colliery in the "Bend" Now in Operation—The Situation in the Massillon District.

POMEROY, O., April 10.—At 3 o'clock this afternoon four hundred strikers and sympathizers from Syracuse, New Haven, Hartford, etc., arrived in Massillon.

They were met by a committee of seven of the strikers, who used persuasive means to induce them to join the strikers.

For two hours the strikers held out stubbornly with the four hundred strikers in the city.

They were assured by Master Workman E. J. Thomas that they would be amply cared for in case they joined the strikers.

The strikers were armed and made no attempt to leave the city.

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SPANIARDS DEFEATED

CUBAN INSURGENTS REPORTED TO HAVE WON A GREAT VICTORY.

Nearly Four Hundred Government Troops Killed and Wounded in a Battle Near the Canto River.

BRITISH CAPTAIN SLAIN

SHOT BECAUSE HE LANDED A PARTY OF INSURRECTIONISTS.

Interview with Patriot Gomez, Who Was Captured by Soldiers and Is Doomed to Die Soon.

TAMPA, Fla., April 10.—Late reports from Havana assert that the steamer Manuella has just arrived from Santiago with more than three hundred wounded Spanish soldiers.

They were taken to the hospitals there because the hospitals at Santiago are crowded. A letter from Santiago mentions a battle at Trocones, near the Canto river.

ROBBED OF \$169,000

SHAREHOLDERS OF A BUILDING AND LOAN ASSOCIATION FLEEDED.

Adlai E. Stevenson, Its President, Alleged to Have Been Paid \$200 a Month as Attorney's Fees.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 10.—The building and loan association committee of the Illinois House to-night adopted a resolution offered by Representative Lowenthal to investigate the Interstate Building and Loan Association, of Bloomington, Ill.

Lowenthal addressed the committee at length regarding the association's condition. He explained that the president of the association, Adlai E. Stevenson, vice president of the United States, was in the habit of receiving \$200 a month in payment for his services as attorney.

He also spoke of the alleged use of the association's funds for the purchase of stock in the Illinois Trust and Savings Bank.

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TO BE TESTED AGAIN

ANOTHER EFFORT TO OVERTHROW THE INCOME-TAX LAW.

Action Begun at New York by Charles Allen Against the Illinois Central Railroad Company.

SCOPE OF THE AVERMENTS

HOW THE LAW WILL BE CONSTRUED BY REVENUE OFFICERS.

Mr. Voorhees on the Reorganization of the Senate Finance Committee—Counterfeit Postage Stamps.

NEW YORK, April 10.—Another suit to test the constitutionality of the income tax has been instituted in the Circuit Court here.

It is an action in equity brought by Charles Allen, of Guilford, Mass., against the Illinois Central Railroad Company.

The counsel for the complainant are Joseph A. Cheate, Clarence A. Seward, William Guthrie, David Wilcox and Charles Steele.

In his bill of complaint, the complainant, after setting forth the organization of the railroad company, the amount of personal property held by it and other matters in relation thereto, declares that he is informed that the company has been enjoined under the provisions of the income tax law to pay a tax of 2 per cent on its net profits and income for the year 1914.

The bill then avers that the income tax law is unconstitutional in that it subjects to tax the net profits of the company's income, and profits, is a direct tax in respect to the railway property fixtures and appurtenances operated and owned by the defendant company by being imposed upon the income and profits thereof.

It is further averred that if the income tax is held not to be a direct tax, it is unconstitutional, in that it is not uniform throughout the United States.

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
