Improvement Resolutions.

The Board of Works advertised improvement resolutions yesterday, as follows: For cement sidewalks on Pearl street, from Illinois to Pennsylvania street; for grading and graveling the first alley west of Shelby, from Sanders to Hill street; for asphaltizing Pennsylvania and Indiana streets and Talbot avenue where the State ditch bridges are now located.

Street Pay Rolls.

The Board of Works yesterday approved the pay roll of the street department, as follows: Street gang, \$112.87; sewer gang, \$119.10; bridge gang, \$128.30. From this it will be seen that the department is rapidly pushing the work of cleaning up the unpaved streets preparatory to placing the city in a good sanitary condition.

Police Sanitary Inspection.

City Sanitarian Wynn is considering the advisability of asking the Board of Safety to instruct the regular patrolmen to make sanitary inspections in the streets at stated intervals and make reports to the Health Department. He thinks such a plan would be worked to the great advantage of the city.

Clifford Avenue Up Again.

The Board of Works yesterday took final action on the resolution for the improvement of Clifford avenue with brick, for asphaltizing Capitol avenue, from Ohio street to Indiana avenue, and for graveling Edgewood street, from Sanders to Brinkmeier street.
