MASSACRES CONTINUED

TURKS ARE STILL SLAUGHTERING CHRISTIANS IN ARMENIA.

Rumors Current that Americans and French Missionaries Have Been Injured or Are in Deadly Peril.

AWFUL SCENES AT ERZROUM

HUNDREDS OF PEOPLE KILLED AND SOME OF THE BODIES SKINNED.

Foreign Embassadors in Possession of Evidence that Orders Were Issued by the Sultan's Palace Clique.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—A dispatch to the Standard from Constantinople says that every day brings news of fresh massacres. It is quite clear if the powers waste additional time in negotiations the need for these negotiations will be passed.

THE ERZROUM MASSACRE. A dispatch to the Daily News from Constantinople says that a European eyewitness present at the Erzroum massacre confirms the statement regarding the heinous nature of the outrages.

THE BATTALION OF TURKS CAPTURED. The most serious state of affairs still prevails at Zeytoon. The Turkish troops, with their arms, ammunition and supplies, and afterwards occupied the barracks and all the strategic positions in and about that city.

THAT MORATORIUM. The Constantinople correspondent of the Times says that the moratorium on commercial affairs has been anything but beneficial. It was essentially an imperial ordinance suggested to the Sultan by interested parties as a measure calculated to calm public excitement and to insure his Majesty's safety.
