40 YEARS THE STANDARD.

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The committee on education submitted a report which was approved. It approved the management of DePauw University and urged liberal contributions to the endowment fund of the university.

The Rev. H. J. Norris, of Logansport, and the Rev. J. K. Wills, of Anderson, were appointed visitors to the General Biblical Institute; the Rev. E. B. New, of Peru, a visitor to the Drew Theological Institute; and the Rev. F. M. Stone, of Nashville, A. A. Beatty, of Logansport, and L. M. Krier, of Logansport, were appointed visitors to the DePauw School of Theology.

The committee on the Freedmen's Aid and Education Society reported that the society now owns forty-five institutions of learning, twenty-three of them devoted to the education of colored people, and of whom 4,845 were in attendance in 1894 and 1895. Twenty-two of the schools are for the education of colored people, and of whom 1,275 were in attendance the same year.

The insurgents have burned thirty houses in the village of Yaguajay, in the province of Matanzas, near Mariano. They have also burned 53 tons of sugar cane near Palmira, in Matanzas.

The Spanish cruiser Alfonso Dese while off the coast of Cuba, captured the Spanish steamer Alava. The commander of the Alava, Captain Garcia, was killed on board. She sailed away in the wind, but the result of the shot being fired and fired five solid shots at the Alava, which thereupon stopped and gave an explanation.

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Twenty-six prisoners have been sent to the fortress of San Juan de los Rios, near Pinar del Rio, by the Spanish troops.

The Mayor of San Nicolas, Ignacio Pizarro, who is charged with conspiring with the insurgents, was arrested by the Spanish troops.
