However, if any be disposed to question the advisability of such a novel, Hoyt can answer effectually by pointing to the audience which nightly turn out to witness this play and laugh until the tears come to their eyes. It can hardly be doubted that many theater-goers have the spirit of reverence so strongly developed that they refuse to accept of all the fun-making that is poked at the funeral subject, but these find so much comedy, song and genuine amusement in the clever situations, that they prefer to swallow the dose, corpse and all, rather than miss the excellent entertainment.
