HOLT WILL CASE IN COURT.

Guemulness of a Tattered Document Found in the Malls in Dispute.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—The trial of the noted Holt will case began to-day. It has been pending a year. The question at issue is the genuineness of a tattered document, the alleged will of the former Judge Advocate-general, Joseph Holt, of Kentucky, which was found in the malls of the register of wills here last year. Judge Holt, who died in August, 1894, was supposed to have died intestate, and the validity of the alleged will, whose mysterious appearance created widespread interest, has been vigorously contested. A notable array of counsel appeared in the case, and the matter was argued before Judge Holt's executor, who was named as executor, and for these appeared ex-Congressman Benjamin Harrison, J. J. A TRIUMPHANT MOSCOW

CEAR AND CZARINA ARRIVE AT THE OLD CAPITAL OF RUSSIA.

And Are Given a Royal Greeting by Loyal Subjects and Visitors, Despite a Downpour of Rain.

CITY ROBED IN GAY ATTIRE

IN HONOR OF THE COMING CORONATION OF THEIR MAJESTIES.

Preparations for the Triumphant Entry of the Rulers of All the Russias on Thursday—Street Scenes.

MOSCOW, May 18.—The interest of all Russians for the time being is centered in this ancient city, where the Czar and Czarina will be crowned Emperor and Empress of all the Russias. The arrival of the Czar and Czarina this afternoon may be said to inaugurate the festival season in celebration of the coronation, and for which the city and the whole empire has made months of preparation. Their majesties arrived in their special train at the Smolensk station at 6:30 o'clock this afternoon. The station is about half way between the Kremlin and the Petrovski palace, which is to be the abiding place of the Czar until the triumphal entry into the city on Thursday.

The train arrived at the station, but this seemed to have no effect on the loyal ardor of the people, and they were gathered at the station to the number of several thousand to accord a welcome greeting to their sovereign and to catch a glimpse of his august person. The streets were full of men, women and children, and steamers flattered fitfully in a gusty breeze.

An imperial pavilion had been erected at the station, into which the members of the imperial party stepped from the train, and from which they stepped into the equipages carried by the royal coachmen to the palace. The pavilion was carpeted and was bright with floral decorations. A squad of the Czarina's regiment of Ulians was the guard of honor on the platform. The Grand Duke Sergius, uncle of the Czar and Governor-general of Moscow, with a brilliant suite of officers, awaited the arrival of the imperial party at the station. The appearance of the train was the signal for an outburst of great cheering, and the military band played a regimental march as the train entered the station and the Czar left the car. The Czarina, when she entered the carriage, was greeted by the cheering of the people, which was adorned with silver spangles, and she was presented with a bouquet.

Their majesties descended the carpeted stairs from the pavilion, entered a carriage and were driven to the Petrovski palace, escorted by cavalry officers of the highest rank. Following their carriage came three troikas, which were occupied by the Grand Duke Sergius and his grand duchess, the Grand Duke Michael Michailovitch, cousin of the late Czar, and his grand duchess, and the infant Grand Duchess Olga Nicolaelevna, daughter of the Czar, who is not six months old. The party, through the cheering of the people, was greeted with great enthusiasm, the route being lined with great crowds of cheering citizens.

NO GUARDS IN CITIZENS' DRESS.

One of the special features of the present events in Moscow is the doing away with the custom of employing special constables to follow the Czar and Czarina. On general occasions the route of the Czar's progress is guarded by a double line of infantry, a double rank of sworn civilians, the ordinary police in uniform, the police of the defense department and the detective police. The doing away with the special constables is a great opportunity for the Czar's subjects at large to witness his progress to the coronation.

At King Ching's court arrived to-day from St. Petersburg. The Chinese envoy was received in the most brilliant manner by the Russian government.
