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ON TRIAL FOR HIS LIFE. WILLIAM PERRY ANSWERS FOR THE KILLING OF LEOTAS M'LEAN. All of Yesterday Spent in Trying to Get a Jury Without Accepting a Single Man.

The Criminal Court spent all of yesterday in trying to get a jury for the trial of William Perry for the murder of Leotas McLean on Hiram Miller's farm, six miles northwest of the city, July 17.
