PLEADS FOR VETERANS

MR. SHAW WANTS PENSION LAWS MORE LIBERALLY CONSTRUED.

Commander-in-Chief of the G. A. R. Thinks Old Soldiers Have Been Deceived by the Cry of Fraud.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—Albert M. Shaw, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, was posted a reception at the Seventy-first Regiment armory to-night by the 102 G. A. R. of Greater New York and vicinity. Fully 3,000 representatives of the various posts were present. Commander Shaw spoke on the subject of pensions, saying in part:

"Again and again I have declared my belief that every needy and worthy veteran of the great war who is entitled to a pension under present laws should be granted one without vexing delays, caused by unnecessary and illiberal technicalities or something worse. Henceforth veterans should demand equal and exact justice under present enactments along the lines of pensions."

"The war produced two classes, in a sense: the creditor class, who loaned money and goods to the Nation, and the brave defenders, who loaned their bodies and lives to save the Union. One has been amply and grandly paid; the other has hardly been paid at all; the other has been half paid, measured by the same standard. After peace blessed the land with plenty on every hand, the volunteer citizen soldiers and sailors voted to save the credit of the Nation, in a battle of the ballots of unprecedented bitterness and intensity, without allowing any question of retribution or well-merited recompense to themselves to enter into the contest."

"There can be no doubt that the cry, 'pension frauds,' 'pension agent sharks' and the like has brought down on the veterans and pensioners of the Union the cruel and as undesired as they have been cruel, and even brutal in a great number of cases. This organized plan of defamatory recalls the masked batteries of war days—those who shout from the rear, the copperheads of that time. It has been the cold-blooded exhibition of men who have placed political expediency in the patriotic halls of justice for more partisan and selfish ends."

"Under President Cleveland this cry against 'pension frauds' to which I have referred reached its climax. After the expenditure of millions of dollars, appropriated by Congress and spent in investigation it was proved conclusively that the pension roll was the purest roll in the world."

"There has never been a period when a deeper feeling of unrest and dissatisfaction existed among the veterans than at the present time upon the question of pensions. It is widely believed that large numbers of applications for pensions are purposefully delayed in allowance and even many worthy cases rejected, though the claim is clearly established as a just one, so as to keep down pension expenditures, regardless of the clear intent of laws passed by a grateful people for the benefit of needy and deserving veterans, and the allowances are seldom what the examining board recommended, 'they are nearly always pared down.' I fear this belief is too well founded. A soldier's widow should not be permitted to suffer in this land of plenty, and we stoutly insist that rule No. 22 should be abrogated and rule No. 14 re-established."

"What is needed, and what is not now enforced, is to have the present pension laws administered in their plain, simple, constructive intent—without any attempt to limit expenditures plainly authorized in their enactment, and without any financial responsibility therefor rest upon Congress, where it properly belongs."

"Alas, how few are the men in their willingness to cheer at the veteran and criticise the war who know all the questions of the moral wrecks and wounds of the service. Keep up such an unfair cry against 'frauds in the churches' as they are doing, and the churches would soon feel the hard hand of blighting and cruel denunciations, and the same would be true with the lawyers and physicians."

"In the financial poverty, comparatively speaking, of our country, in the last days of the surviving veterans of the revolution all were granted pensions. Why should not every needy and deserving veteran of the great war that we have fought be granted our conscript fathers from overthrow, in its unimpaired and unimpaired wealth, be promptly granted a pension?"

"I have no doubt our pension laws are not being executed in their plain, simple, constructive intent, and this belief cuts my heart like a poisoned pain. The time has come when impertinent questions and worthy applications for pensions, and their provisions, and any policy which fails to carry this out is in itself an injustice. Any officials who by their acts thwart the generous spirit of justice do a wrong of almost unexampled heartlessness—considered in the light of suffering veterans whose bounty is thus kept from them in their old age by unworthy men charged with the honorable execution of the laws."

Rate War Goes Merrily On.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 11.—The Chicago tick rate involved in the transcontinental fare was dropped to-day to \$38, and the St. Paul ticket to \$32. The Great Northern is also making a cut to Missouri river points, but owing to light travel the Oregon and Burlington lines have not yet taken a hand, though also both are expected to meet and rate to protect business. No settlement of the difficulty is in sight.

TO AVERT BOMBARDMENT.

Instructions Are Sent to Minister Loomis at Caracas.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—United States Minister Loomis has advised the State Department of the impending bombardment of General Parra's forces in Puerto Cabello by the forces of General Castro. The minister has evidently looked to the department for instructions, and these are to go forward at once. If it shall appear that the bombardment can be conducted without immediate danger to life and property of foreigners and innocent people in Puerto Cabello, the minister will not interfere in any way. On the other hand, there probably will be no objection to his endeavoring to avert the bombardment through peaceful representations directed to the combatants. Meanwhile, the State Department has instructed Hemphill to act in accord with the instructions which have been given to Minister Loomis.

MONEY HIDDEN EVERYWHERE

A Stillwater, Minn., Man Was Suspicious of the Banks.

STILLWATER, Minn., Nov. 11.—When Hen. George Vollmeyer, an old resident of Stillwater, died a few weeks ago, everybody was surprised that his property did not amount to much, as he was considered a man of means. His last will left all his property to his two sons, except a small amount to each of his daughters, and contest proceedings were commenced. Disclosure was asked for, but nothing further in the way of a will was found, and to-day the widow gave permission to search the house for means. Her last will was found there, estimated from \$7,000 to \$10,000, was hidden in cracks and crevices everywhere. Mr. Vollmeyer always considered himself a miser, and he was indeed, until every article in the house has been examined.

CANAL MAY BE OPENED.

Judge Kohlsaat Decides in Favor of the Sanitary Commissioners.

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—Judge C. C. Kohlsaat, in the United States Circuit Court to-day, rendered an important decision in the drainage canal case, holding that the Federal Court has jurisdiction, and refusing to remand it. The Illinois and Michigan canal commissioners had brought injunctive proceedings against the sanitary district to prevent the turning of the water of lake Michigan into the big canal. The Illinois and Michigan commissioners contended that the legal battle should be fought in the Circuit Court of Will county, where they expected to be able to win, and Judge Kohlsaat's decision was regarded as favorable to the sanitary district and is expected to result in a speedy settlement of the points at issue. It is now believed the canal will be opened Dec. 1.

TOOK A TRAY OF DIAMONDS.

A Tramp Who Had Worn of Penalties Wandering.

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 11.—Ed Beal, who says he is from California, walked into Solomon Joseph's jewelry store at one of the most prominent corners in the city this evening and asked to be shown a tray of diamonds. It was handed to him, and instantly he picked it up, tucked it under his arm and started for the door. He got outside and was running toward an alley when Mr. Joseph overtook and seized him. The diamonds on the tray, about \$2,000 worth, were scattered over the sidewalk and pavement. Beal was locked up and explained that he was penniless and had beaten his way from California this far on his way to New York. All the stones were recovered.

FIGHT WITH ROBBERS.

One Bandit Killed and Two Policemen Dangerously Wounded.

TIUSVILLE, Pa., Nov. 11.—Three masked robbers blew open the safe at the Dunkirk, Allegheny Valley & Pittsburgh railway ticket office late last night, but secured only about \$20. The bandits then went to a disorderly house on East Spring street and on entering presented revolvers and proceeded to rob the proprietors of what amounted to \$1,000 worth of jewelry and \$60 in cash. Chief of Police McGrath, meanwhile, had discovered their whereabouts and, in company with Officer Sheely, attempted their arrest. A fight ensued in which about twenty shots were fired, three of which struck Chief McGrath, one in the abdomen and two in the left shoulder. Officer Sheely was shot in the mouth, the ball passing through the side of the neck, inflicting a dangerous wound. In the confusion the robbers escaped. Later, the dead body of one of the robbers was found near the railway works, about two blocks from the scene of the combat, with a bullet through his breast. There is a rumor that another of the gang is lying badly wounded at East Tienville.

CAPITAIN OF LUZON

LAWTON TRYING TO EFFECT A JUNCTION WITH WHEATON'S TROOPS.

Advancing with Difficulty, Owing to the Washing Out of Bridges and Sweeping Away of Rafts.

SKIRMISH WITH FILIPINOS

MACARTHUR'S MEN KILL TWENTY-NINE INSURGENTS IN A FIGHT.

Another Sample of the Methods Used by Aguinaldo to Delude His Followers—Relying on Bryan.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Three important dispatches from General Otis were received at the War Department to-day, showing the hardships and difficulties encountered by our troops in their advance against the insurgent forces, and showing the line of argument put forward to sustain the insurrection. The dispatches are as follows:

"Severe typhoons over Panay last two days impeded the march of General Hughes' troops; his column is several miles north of west of Iloilo. Insurgents have abandoned strong defences in that section."

"Lawton pushing his troops through on the Lupadangan and San Quentin road. The country is submerged, bridges and recently-constructed rafts are washed away and wheel transportation almost impossible. His reliance is on cavalry, a few infantrymen and native guides."

"MacArthur commenced his advance early this morning. Yesterday two companies of the Seventeenth Infantry, under the Malabon and Concepcion road, struck back into the insurgent country, killing twenty-nine men and capturing some arms. The dispatches reported three wounded."

"A number of insurgent official dispatches were captured yesterday in the north and forwarded by Lawton last night. They indicate a directed abandonment of the insurgent country in the vicinity of Cabanatuan and San Jose, and hurried movements by way of the valley of the Pasig and the coming thence on to Apirra. Among the dispatches is the following:

"On Nov. 5—Otis did not accept proposition to-day. Enemy attacked our outposts because Otis promised McKinley to take Parang to-day. The enemy broke through. Take care of prisoners, as therein lies our great hope, especially (top) our wives. There is no such mischief (7) either by the government or by Miguel. Spanish commissioners are developing leading units of insurgents. Our government sent them away and they withdrew to the mountains. The government has compliance between Germany, France, Russia and Spain is a fact. Before December we will know our fate. Throughout Europe there is sympathy for our cause—American Democrats clearly in our favor; they are sure of Bryan's election. Do not pay attention to your affairs and never mind the rest."

"The dispatches are given verbatim as received with several unintelligible words including 'miscuit.' Inquiry is being made to learn whether this is a cable error or a word used in the insurgent dispatch."
