A YEAR'S POLICE WORK

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT QUIGLEY SUBMITTED.

He Recommends Large Additions to the Force and Four Substations—Works Board Affairs.

Superintendent Quigley, of the police department, made his annual report for the year 1899 to the Board of Public Safety yesterday afternoon. He calls the board's attention to the necessity of increasing the police department, as he says the outlying districts are constantly becoming more thickly populated and the demand for better police service is correspondingly greater.

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Superintendent Quigley says the police department does not keep abreast with the increased population and territorial expansion and the lack of men is felt daily. Superintendent Quigley further recommends that four police substations be erected in the four quarters of the city. The patrol wagon service is greatly hampered by the wagon having to travel so far. He says other cities of less population are in advance of Indianapolis in their police departments. The police force now numbers 189, but should be 171, as there are 20,654, and in addition there were 6,376 wagon and miscellaneous calls. The report shows that there were 6,644 arrests during the year. Of this number, 4,191 were males and 2,453 females.

THE DISMISSALS

The report refers to the dismissal of the twenty-one members of the police force last December by the Board of Public Safety, the discharges being made, the report claims, to make the department more efficient.
