WILL SUCCEED D. K. GOSS

CALVIN N. KENDALL, OF NEW HAVEN, CONN., PROBABLY THE MAN... School Board Admits that Negotiations Are On, Although Matter Was Denied Two Weeks Ago.

Calvin N. Kendall will succeed David K. Goss as superintendent of the Indianapolis public schools. This information was received by the Journal last night in a telegram from New Haven, Conn., where Mr. Kendall is now occupying the position of superintendent of the schools of that city.

The members of the School Board have been figuring on a success to Superintendent Goss for several weeks, and it has been known among a few of their friends that they would endeavor to get the best man available in the United States for the place. When the news was received in this city last night Mr. Goss was seen by a Journal representative and a copy of the message was read to him.

There were about fifteen Indiana men either at the place or whose names had been suggested to the School Board.

PRESIDENT SLOAN PLEASSED... George W. Sloan, president of the Indianapolis School Board, was asked last night about the report that Mr. Kendall would come to Indianapolis, and he replied that he had heard nothing officially concerning the matter.

Mr. Goss, the present superintendent, will remain in charge of the Indianapolis schools until the end of the school year. It is expected that Mr. Kendall will remove his family to Indianapolis early in the summer in order to familiarize himself with the city and the school work.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Feb. 3.—The New Haven Board of Education, at a special meeting held this afternoon, agreed conditionally to release Calvin N. Kendall, who has been for five years superintendent of schools, in order that he may accept a more advantageous offer from Indianapolis.

AMERICAN NOVEL A JOKE

IT IS SO ANALYZED BY REV. WILLIAM A. QUAYLE IN HIS LECTURE... He Talked Entertainingly Yesterday of Poetry and Poets and Literature Generally.

Yesterday afternoon Rev. William A. Quayle gave a delightful lecture on "The Rise of American Poetry." This was the first of three lectures in this series, the others being one on "American Poetry" and one on "American Poets."

He began his talk with brief introductory discussion on the American novel, which he analyzed as a huge joke. He said the notion of an American novel is a bad notion and not at all desirable.

Another hindrance was that we had no antiquity, which is treated as a theme for poetry; another hindrance was no legends or mythology. However, now we have an advantage in having an English realm of beauty.

A telegram received by Governor Mount from General Shafter yesterday afternoon apprised him that in all probability the body of General Lawton would lie in state in this city on Tuesday instead of Wednesday, as had been previously supposed.

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On receipt of the above telegram the various committees were instructed to make all arrangements for Tuesday, and each one of them is working with redoubled energy. All of the various sub-committees met in the Governor's parlors yesterday for the purpose of reporting to the general committee.

The committee on finance reported that all money necessary to defray the expenses was in sight, and it would have no trouble in collecting it. General McKee said that eight companies of militia had volunteered to march in the funeral procession.
