DEBATE ON THE PORTO RICAN RELIEF APPROPRIATION BILL.

Arkansas Jones Proposes Substitute—Remarks of Messrs. Fairbanks, Cockrell, Spooner and Others.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—"I assert most emphatically that when the senator says I told him I should not speak on this subject he does not state the truth."

Mr. Fairbanks expressed amazement over the statement that there was no dissent in the Porto Rican relief bill.

Mr. Jones, of Arkansas, offered the following, which was adopted:

"Whereas, Frequent complaints are being made from many sections of the Indian Territory that the same are being neglected, and are incompetent, inattentive to their duties, and are not discharging the duties justly required of them by the laws of the United States;

"Resolved, That the committee on Indian affairs be directed to inquire into the truth of these allegations and report to the Senate.

When the morning business had been finished Mr. Sullivan, of Mississippi, took the floor to deliver his announced speech on our relations with the Philippines, but at the request of Mr. Allison yielded for the immediate consideration of the bill appropriating for the benefit of the government of Porto Rico revenues collected on imports into the island.
