REPORT ON BOOKKEEPING

THE SYSTEM EMPLOYED BY THE SCHOOL BOARD CONDEMNED. All the Funds Accounted for, but in a Roundabout Way—Deputy Auditor Dunn's Statement.

Experts W. S. Ryan and C. P. Shepard, appointed by Mayor Taggart under the new law to examine the books of the School Board, filed their report with the board yesterday.

The accounts of the treasurer are very unsatisfactory. His account is a receptacle for every penny that he receives to the credit of the school city, and every warrant he pays is charged against such account.

Continuing the report says: "We desire most earnestly to condemn the false balance of the special fund account of June 20, 1900, the account shows a balance on hand of \$72,443.36, whereas such balance has been drawn against by the tuition fund for the amount of \$76,222.96, thereby showing a deficit in the special fund of \$3,779.60, which fact the account books of the board do not disclose.

The manual training fund shows a balance of \$38,123.30 on June 20, 1900, having reverted to the special fund. The report goes on to say that the "revisions contemplated by the act of 1899 should carry all the amount of the fund over to the manual training fund, or others controlled specially, back to the special fund, at the close of the fiscal year.

The books, now show a balance of \$72,443.36, which is the amount of the fund, and the saving of that mortifying fact by the concealment of the account is a most unfortunate one that a practical solution of the question of fact that the board must at some time adjust.

BALANCES SHOULD REVERT. The report says that balances in other funds should have reverted to the special fund and that accounts receiving appropriations should be closed each year and that the treasurer should make monthly reports showing disbursements, receipts and balances.
