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WENT UP LIKE A KITE

OCTOBER PORK BULGED A DOLLAR AND HALF ON THE D.Y.

This Had an Influence on the Entire List—Small Advances Made in Wheat—Other Cereals Steady.

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—Wheat was irregular, but turned firm towards the end, on good cash demand and in sympathy with the strength of Octo-

ber pork. November closing 4c over yesterday's market, on close buying.

Provisions, for January delivery, 2 1/2c higher. October pork closed 1 1/2c higher.

November wheat opened 1/2c lower to unchanged, at 77 1/2c. Liverpool was 1/2c higher, but buyers were independent.

Finally, the outside was not buying, selling by local longs sent November down to 76c. Northwest receipts were small, rain was not heavy.

Wheat and the cash situation later improved, local sales being reported at 30 1/2c. Under these considerations the market began slowly to rally, and towards the end of the session rallied sharply to 77 1/2c. In sympathy with the bulge in October pork, the close was firm, November 4c higher, at 77 1/2c. Clearances, in wheat and flour, were equal to 100,000 bu. Primary receipts aggregated 1,063,000 bu., compared with 1,200,000 bu. for Minneapolis and Duluth reported 423 cars, against 371 last week and 1,014 a year ago. Local receipts were 1,000,000 bu. for the week.

Corn was quiet. The market dipped slightly, early on local selling, in which the poor cash demand for the week was a factor. A recovery came later, in sympathy with the strength of the market, and the close was 1/2c higher, at 37 1/2c. Receipts were 1,000,000 bu. for the week, compared with 1,200,000 bu. for Minneapolis and Duluth reported 423 cars, against 371 last week and 1,014 a year ago.

Oats were quiet and steady. There was heavy demand for the week, but buyers were independent. The market was 1/2c higher, at 27 1/2c. Receipts were 1,000,000 bu. for the week, compared with 1,200,000 bu. for Minneapolis and Duluth reported 423 cars, against 371 last week and 1,014 a year ago.

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
