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

GENERAL MILES IN CUBA. He Will Inspect the Principal Military Posts of the Island. HAVANA, March 18.—Lieutenant General Miles, who is attending to inspect the principal military posts in Cuba, arrived here to-day with his party from the United States. Governor General Wood has appointed a commission to revise the Cuban customs, consisting of Collector Bliss as president and Ramon Williams, Antonio Rivero, Juan Bacardi, Louis Blase and Laureano Rodriguez.

Satisfied with General Wood. WASHINGTON, March 18.—Secretary Root today authorized the statement that the administration had entire confidence in the conduct of affairs in Cuba by Governor General Wood. The secretary of war, moreover, said that the recent course of General Wood in connection with the constitutional convention, held at Washington, and that both the President and himself approved of General Wood's decision to decline to attend the convention. The official information forwarded to Washington did not accurately reflect the real condition of affairs in Cuba.

MR. WU IN CHICAGO. China's Representative Meets Mayor Harrison and "Hah, Hah" Boys. CHICAGO, March 18.—Wa Tingfang, minister to the United States, arrived in Chicago to-day, and will be the guest of President Harper and the faculty of the University of Chicago during his three days' stay. Mr. Wu will deliver the congratulatory address of the University of Chicago at the Studebaker Theater to-morrow afternoon, and before and after that time will attend a series of dinners and receptions planned in his honor. Mr. Wu was welcomed to Chicago by Mayor Harrison shortly after 10 o'clock, and he and Mayor Harrison spent the evening at a dinner at the Hotel Sherman. The Chinese minister was very courteous in regard to the coming municipal election in Chicago, and he and Mayor Harrison spent some time in chatting over political affairs in general. A reception was given Minister Wu at the Hankow Club, where the University of Chicago to-night. Here the student body of the University met the distinguished diplomat.

Stolen Child Recovered. EL PASO, Tex., March 18.—The remarkable recovery of an El Paso girl at Danville, Ind., ten years after she had been kidnapped, has just been announced here through the Associated Press dispatches. The missing girl was Frank W. Taylor, six years of age. She was the daughter of Mrs. Anna Stevens, the widow of a Texas cattleman who was killed by a band of robbers. Mrs. Stevens had placed her little daughter with a childless couple, and one day she disappeared. Mrs. Taylor, the child, was found at Danville, Ind., and she had been living there for ten years. She was recognized by her mother, and she is now being brought home to her parents.

Chicken Thief Lost Stolen Notes. Special to the Indianapolis Journal.
