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LIVE STOCK QUOTATIONS

CATTLE FAIRLY ACTIVE AT STEADY PRICES FOR GOOD GRADES.

Hogs Active and Two and a Half to Five Cents Higher—Sheep Active and Steady—Other Markets.

UNION STOCKYARDS, INDIANAPOLIS, March 19.—Cattle—Receipts, 550; shipments, 100.

The receipts of cattle were a good average for this time in the week, but not large.

The quality was about as satisfactory as it has been recently, although there were very few top kinds in their class represented.

The market opened with an inclination among buyers to want their supplies some lower, but salesmen held for steady prices, and finally the trading was reasonably active on that basis.

As usual, there was some complaint about the satisfactory market for undesirable cattle, but at the close of trade a very good clearance of all kinds had been made.

The best steers here, weighing 1,325 pounds, sold at \$5.75; other sales included 1,280 to 1,312-pound steers at \$4.90 and 1,000-pound steers at \$4.30.

Stockers and feeders were reported at \$3.50 to \$4.00. Heifers sold as high as \$4.50 and the top price for cows was \$4.25.
