NOTRUTH IN THE REPORTS.

THE C. H. & D. HAS NOT BEEN SECURED BY OUTSIDE PARTIES. Erie-Pennsylvania Scheme Complicating Matters in Central Traffic Association Territory.

The Commercial and Financial World of March 26 contained a lengthy article concerning the affairs of the Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton road. Among other things it said: "In some way or other nobody seems to know exactly how reports have got into circulation to the effect that this road has been secured by outside parties."

Below is given the earnings of 1897 and of 1900, the operations in both years covering 651 miles of railroad. The gross earnings in 1897 from passenger business were \$1,253,394; in 1900, \$1,483,281; freight earnings in 1897, \$2,783,742; in 1900, \$3,505,366; with express and miscellaneous earnings included in 1897 a total of \$4,627,532 is shown; in 1900, \$5,755,550. Available revenue in 1897, \$1,338,670; in 1900, \$1,728,848; dividends paid in 1897, \$264,000; in 1900, \$371,225; balance in 1897, \$137,340; in 1900, \$210,633.

An Elegant New Train. The Big Four's new passenger train was on exhibition yesterday at the Union Station and was visited by several thousand people, among them many ladies, each of whom received a carnation, over six hundred being distributed. Boxes of fine cigars were open to the train during the day.

Personal, Local and General Notes. J. C. McCullough, president of the Chicago & Erie, returned from an enjoyable trip to Mexico.

Frank Fendress has resigned the position of personal injury agent of the Erie & Ohio, which he held for years, and has returned to the practice of law.

Several of the strongest lines west of the Missouri river have decided to place their sale in transmississippi territory 2,000-mile tickets at a flat rate of 2 cents a mile.

So far the Toledo, St. Louis & Western has not been able to get the Erie & Ohio to run between Toledo and Chicago, and withdrawal of its ticket office from Cleveland, O.

On Saturday the Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton will start a new passenger train, to run between Cincinnati and Chicago, answering the one placed in service by the Monon at the same time.

When the Big Four put on the White Special, five years ago, the first year it earned 60 cents per mile run; in 1900 it earned \$1.32 per mile, and every month the business of the train is increasing.

Harry Parry, the well-known general agent of the New York Central and West, is recovering from a serious illness. He is recovering from an operation for appendicitis.

The Southern Railway is now running a solid mail train, stopping only at Junction points between New York and Jacksonville, and at intermediate points on the line.

W. L. Stow & Co., brokers, of New York city, said yesterday that they had bought control of the Mexican Central Railroad Company from the American and British interests in the Southwest. They declined to give the names of their principals.

The Lake Shore has another congestion of business. At Toledo, Ind., where there were 1,500 loaded cars to move and no power to move them, every engine being in service, the congestion exists with other Toledo roads, it is stated.



READY FOR CARNIVAL. Athletic Events at Tomlinson Hall To-night Will Be Interesting.

Everything is now in readiness for the first annual athletic indoor carnival to be held in Tomlinson hall to-night. Carpenters were at work in the hall yesterday building the tracks for the running events. The track is eight feet wide, with a three-foot bank five feet wide on the turns. It was found to be necessary to make a thirty-five yard straightaway course, instead of forty yards, as floor space is limited.

A Violin Recital. An enjoyable violin recital was given in the auditorium of the German House, last night, by the pupils of Christian Oelschlagel. The programme was large and varied and served admirably to demonstrate the proficiency acquired by Mr. Oelschlagel's pupils.

Enforcing the New Game Law. E. E. Earle, deputy game warden, now at Shelby, Ind., reports much active work in the vicinity of the marshes of the northern part of the State. Seven regular deputies and a number of special officers are there endeavoring to enforce the new game law.

Contract for a \$250,000 Building. The contract for the erection of the new power plant building of John W. and Edward Schmidt, at Maryland and Pennsylvania streets, was awarded yesterday to John Woelcher & Co. The cost of the building will be \$250,000.

Executive Board Won't Meet Here. Secretary Wilson, of the United Mine Workers, is in communication with President Mitchell, in the anthracite district, but will give out no information regarding negotiations to avert a possible industrial contest.

Close Resembled Mrs. Nation. There was considerable excitement about the Bates House yesterday morning when a woman who, the guests thought, bore a strong resemblance to Mrs. Carrie Nation, arrived at the hotel and registered as "K. W. Noble." The new arrival was not Mrs. Nation, but a representative of a Chicago chewing-gum house.

Committed Suicide in Washington. The police here have been asked by the Washington, D. C., police department to locate and care for some effects of Margaret Grace Maher, who left here last week and early yesterday morning committed suicide in a room at Mrs. C. City. She was formerly in resort in this city.

Pepper Goes to the Denison. Edward W. Pepper, a popular young man who has been chief clerk at the Hotel English, has resigned, and will become a member of the office force at the Denison Hotel.

Maryland's New Election Law. Salt Lake Tribune. Charles J. Bonaparte, of Maryland, has taken a long look at Mr. Governor's election bill and pronounces it "thoroughly bad.
