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WASHINGTON ALLEY SCORES. INDIANS VS. ORIENTALS. NAVAHRRES VS. RED RAVENS. A Good Law. An Indiana statute giving the wages of workingmen to the extent of \$50 preference over other forms of indebtedness in the case of an employer whose business has been suspended by the action of creditors has been declared constitutional by the Supreme Court of that State. There is substantial justice in this decision. The property that has been created by labor does not rightfully belong to the employer until the workingman's contract share in it has been delivered into his hands. It is only the remainder of the product which belongs to the employer and can be properly devoted to the payment of his just indebtedness.

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
