The amount of railway capital outstanding June 30, 1900, was \$1,432,083,999. The amount assigned to a mileage basis represents a capitalization of \$61,499 per mile of track. Of this amount, \$1,522,291,828 was common stock and \$1,225,735,795 preferred stock.

REVENUE PER MILE.

The average revenue per passenger per mile for the year ending June 30, 1900, was 2.96 cents. For the preceding year it was 2.93 cents.

PASSENGER CASUALTIES.

The number of passengers killed during the year was 1,109, an increase of 141,556 from the number killed during the preceding year.
